THE PARCELS POST

One of our subscribers writes as follows:
"We see that the Postmaster General is going to recommend the Parcels Post. Good for him. The merchant can't have his way all the time. If he can't make a living selling goods, let him get out and rustle on the farm like the rest of us. Is he any better?"

The average merchant is probably no better than the average farmer. He is probably just as good, and no better; but it is certain that he is no more narrow-minded than the individual who penned the foregoing paragraph. The poorest man on earth is the one who is poor in spirit and is continually harping that other people think they are better than he is.

The interests of the farmer and the country merchant who buys the farmers' produce are identical, and no harm can come to one without affecting the other. If the proposed Parcels Post will increase the country merchant's trade and enable him to pay the farmer a better price for his produce, it will be a good thing for the country. If it should decrease the trade of the country merchant and increase the trade of the city mail order houses that buy nothing of the farmer, it would be a bad thing for the country. The Observer thinks it would be a bad thing. The question of one man being better than another does not figure in it, at all. It is merely a matter of cold-blooded business.

The financial situation in New York is rapidly improving. Seven million dollars in gold arrived from Europe, Wednesday, and twenty-four million more will arrive this week. The New York banks began paying their Western creditors yesterday, and gold will soon be flowing Westward in a yellow stream. Then we will hear no more talk of panic.

Program at Colosseum Rink.

The steel for the new bridge in Falls City arrived in Dallas yesterday.

The car was sidetracked in the terminal yards, and will be held until the \$400 due for hauling the steel from Indiana is paid. As the Governor is declaring each day a holiday, the county court is holding no meetings and consequently no warrant can be issued for the freight. Unless the contractors or the business men of Falls City come to the rescue, it is probable that the bridge will remain in Dallas until the holidays are called off.

TWO TRAINS TAKEN OFF

Closing of Sawmills Necessitates Change in Train Service on Dallas and Falls City Road.

The condition of the lumber market has necessitated a change in the schedule of the Dallas and Falls City railroad, and has resulted in the discontinuance of the 11 o'clock train to Falls City and the logging train to Newberg. The stub trains between Falls City and Black Rock have also been discontinued.

The regular morning train will hereafter leave Dallas at 7:15, and will run through to Black Rock. It will leave Black Rock as soon as the necessary switching can be done, and will leave Falls City for Dallas between 10 and 11 o'clock. The afternoon train will leave Dallas at 3:20, and will run to Falls City only. Returning, it will leave Falls City at 4:30.

As soon as the road can adjust its business to the new conditions, a permanent schedule will be announced. The passenger coach will be out of the repair shop in about two weeks, and will then be put on the run again. The coach is being thoroughly overhauled, and will be furnished with upholstered leather seats. About \$700 is being expended in its improvement.

Manager Gerlinger says the curtailment of train service was made imperative by the closing down of several of the mills and logging camps and the uncertainty of others continuing in operation. He is anxious to give the patrons of the road the best possible service, and will arrange the very best train schedule that the business of the road will justify under present unfortunate conditions.
