The discussion was general, and many valuable plans and suggestions for increasing the usefulness of the schools were offered. President Mock, of Dallas College, read a highly instructive paper on "The Value of the Organized Class," and held the closest attention of the delegates while he told of his success in organizing his class of young men in this city.

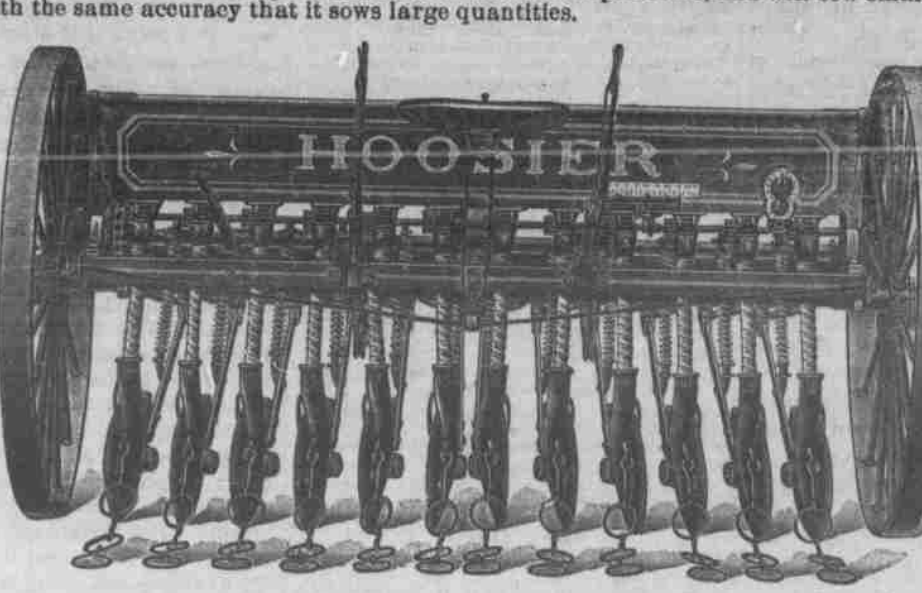
The convention will adjourn this afternoon, after the election of officers for the coming year.
