BUILDING LARGE AIRSHIP

Pacific Coast Inventors Believe They Have Solved Problem of Aerial Navigation.

Alexander Otis spent several days in Dallas last week in the interest of the National Airship Company, of which he is an officer and representative. He returned to Portland yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Otis is a Russian by birth, and has been a resident of the United States only a few years. He was a student of Dallas College in 1900, and has many friends in this city.

The National Airship Company, which he represents, is constructing a mammoth airship with which it proposes to make the trip between New York and London within 24 hours, carrying 500 passengers and 40 tons of freight.

The main features of the airship are inventions of Andrew Morrell, an inventor of international prominence, but Mr. Otis also holds patents on several of the important devices that enter into the construction of this huge machine. Lincoln Beachey, whom many Polk county people will remember as the daring young aeronaut at the Lewis and Clark Fair, is an employee of Mr. Otis' company.

The plan, as explained by Mr. Otis, seems plausible. When it was remarked to him that if his company absolutely had what it claimed, its project must undoubtedly be successful, he replied: "We have not only everything we claim, but many other things we have not made public." And those who know the man have no doubt that he spoke truly. "All we need now," said Mr. Otis, "is the money, and that is the greatest difficulty of all, for it is so hard for people to have faith in anything that is new and wonderful."

Should this company be successful in carrying to a consummation its magnificent scheme, the next five years will no longer see the problem of aerial navigation an idle dream of the future, nor the sport of a few moneyed adventurers, but a fixed and absolute fact of untold commercial value to the world.

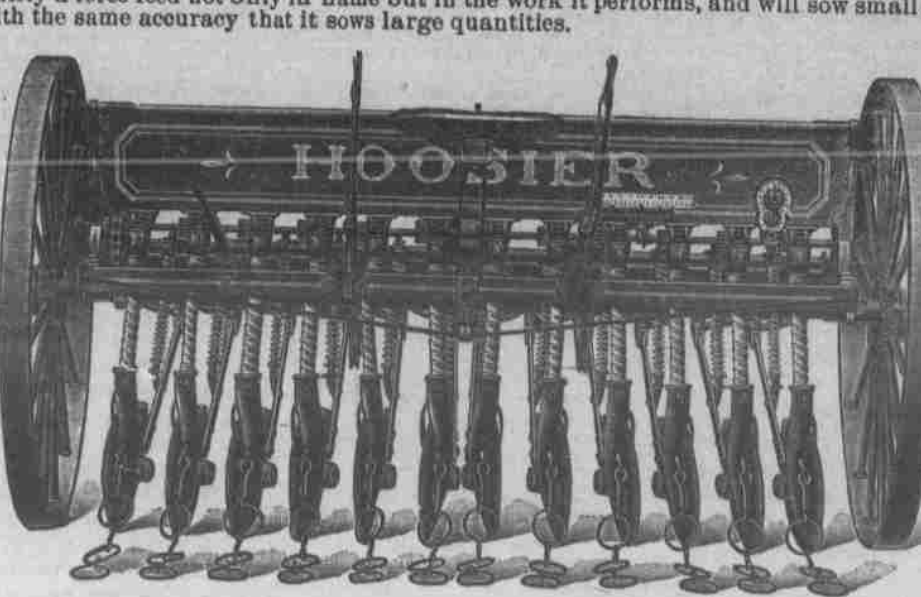
