Monday's Journal—C. W. Hodson was elected President of the Portland Commercial Club at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Two brief little paragraphs, but sufficient to show the contrast between the news service of the two papers. In the same issue of the Telegram in which Mr. Hodson's election was predicted, (after he had already been elected), a large space on the front page was given to the production of a supposed-to-be funny cartoon in which the country editor was made the butt of the old woodcut-on-subscription gag. At the very moment the sleepy old sheet was attempting to poke fun at newspapers of the country towns, it was being "scooped" right at home by a wide-awake competitor. One paper was attending to its own business and printing the news; the other was making a cheap attempt to belittle the business of the interior newspapers, and thereby overlooking an interesting item right at its own door. The mossback journalism of Oregon is not to be found in the country towns. It is confined to the office of the Oregonian's verminiform appendix.

The fruitraisers who are promoting the Dallas cannery project are taking up the enterprise in a sensible and business-like way. Instead of starting out with a large and expensive plant, they propose to invest only a moderate amount of money at the outset, thereby insuring a profit to the stockholders from the day the doors are opened for business. Large blocks of stock will be held in reserve, and as the business increases and the investment of additional capital becomes necessary, these shares will be placed on the market. By pursuing this course, the stockholders will be protected at all times, and the financial success of the enterprise will be assured.
