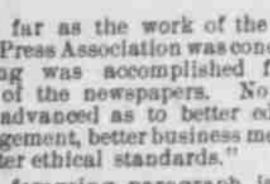

"So far as the work of the recent State Press Association was concerned, nothing was accomplished for the good of the newspapers. No ideas were advanced as to better editorial management, better business methods, or better ethical standards."

The foregoing paragraph is from the pen of Colonel Hofer, of the Salem Journal, and is being copied by papers whose editors did not attend the meeting and therefore know nothing of what was done. Friend Hofer himself did not show up until just at the closing hour, having been unavoidably detained in Corvallis. Coming into the meeting just before the hour of adjournment, and having had no part in the business discussions of the day and a half preceding, it becomes him to speak slightly of the work accomplished by the Association. Over one hundred active newspaper publishers attended the Portland meeting, and almost without exception they expressed themselves as feeling highly gratified by the steps taken to place the interior press of Oregon on a higher and better basis. It is hardly probable that all these men were wrong, and the eleventh-hour Salem editor right.

While Prosecutor Henny probably has insufficient evidence in his possession to make out a case against C. W. Fulton, he has brought out enough facts in the trial of the Hall case to show the intimate political connection of the Senator with the ring now under indictment for complicity in the land frauds. It is a dirty political mess altogether, and the best thing for the voters of Oregon to do is to throw the whole bunch out of office and call for a new deal. Our state can never hope to have the standing to which it is entitled until every taint of the land frauds has been removed from its officials.

WILL HAVE FINE BAND

Vern Bartlett Meets Great Success in Organizing Musicians of Dallas.

At the meeting held recently for the purpose of organizing a band in Dallas, the interest shown by the young men was very encouraging. Mr. Bartlett had intended to organize a band of 25 pieces, and the fact that 27 young men have already signed up for instruments is a most hopeful indication for the success of the enterprise.

The instruments will be ordered at once, and practice will be begun immediately upon their arrival. Two nights a week will be given to general practice by the entire band, and Mr. Bartlett will devote the remaining nights to special instruction for those who are to play the more difficult instruments.

If the interest in the work is sustained, he expects to have the band well in hand and ready for the season of carnivals and picnics that will begin in May and extend through the two succeeding months.

Prohibition Oratorical Contest.

The Students' Prohibition Association has arranged its annual local oratorical contest for February 28. At this time the representative for Dallas College in the State Oratorical Contest will be chosen. Dallas College has been remarkably successful during the past five years, winning three first places in the State Contest and one second place in the Inter-State Contest. The members of the association are showing great interest in their preparation for the coming tryout, and an interesting and exciting contest may be expected.
