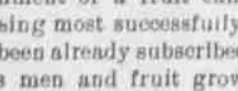

STOCK SELLS RAPIDLY.
The work of soliciting funds for the
establishment of a fruit cannery is
progressing most successfully, \$1,700
having been already subscribed by the
business men and fruit growers of
Dallas and vicinity for the support of
the enterprise. The papers are being
circulated by J. L. Brown and Joe
Dunn, two of the members of the com-
mittee appointed by the Horticultural
Society, and many names are being
added daily to the already long list of
those who will buy stock in the newly
organized company.
