MILL WILL RESUME WORK

Dallas Lumber Company's Plant Will Begin Operations This Week After Long Idleness.

B. C. Miles, manager of the Spaulding Lumber Company, was in Dallas yesterday, and preparations are under way for resuming work in the Dallas sawmill during this week.

The machinery will be put in readiness, and work will be commenced with a full crew of men tomorrow (Wednesday) morning if possible.

A sufficient supply of logs is on hand to run the mill for some time, and the logging crews will resume work in the camps on the Rickreall as soon as possible. If no unforeseen accident occurs to prevent, it is the intention of the company to keep the mill in steady operation from this time on.

This sawmill has been inactive for some time, and it is believed that its re-opening will have an instant and far reaching effect for the betterment of labor conditions in this city and the surrounding country.
