**PLAN INVITES DEFEAT.**

The little gang of would-be Republican leaders in Oregon who are seeking to evade the Direct Primary law should have sense enough to know that they are tampering with fire. The plan that is being formulated in several counties to hold conventions to "indorse" candidates for office is nothing in the world but a scheme to set the provisions of the new primary law at naught, and these leaders know it. It is a dangerous and foolish movement—one that if persisted in will ring the death knell of any chance of Republican success at the polls in June.

It must be remembered that the Republican party is responsible for the enactment of the Direct Primary law in Oregon. True, the measure was also advocated by the Democrats and Populists, but without Republican votes it never could have become a law. It should also be borne in mind that the law is favored by a very large element of Republican voters who will vigorously resent any attempt to nullify or evade a single one of its provisions. It is a fact of the deepest significance that the voter who is in favor of the Direct Primary law believes in it with all his heart and soul, and whether right or wrong, he will express these convictions in a way that will leave no doubt as to his sincerity when he casts his vote in June, in the event that the would-be bosses defeat his will in the primaries by the proposed "convention" plan.

In sounding this note of warning, the *OBSERVER* is actuated solely by a desire for Republican success at the coming election. As our readers will know, this paper never favored the Direct Primary plan of nominating officers, and it does not favor it now. But we are not willing to see the Republican party in Oregon commit suicide merely to gratify our personal opinion. Party principles and party success should mean more than that to every individual. We respect the honesty and sincerity of the men whose views differ from ours, and we further realize that there is a very large and a very respectable number of Republican voters in Oregon whose views so differ. These men have the law on their side, and it behooves the rest of us to live up to that law and obey it, whether we believe in it or not. The new primary law is now on trial. Let the trial be fair.

When the *OBSERVER* happens to print any editorial or news item to which any individual or newspaper takes exception, it is always ready and willing to grant such individual or newspaper the right to answer in its columns. This privilege has never been refused any person in all of the years the present publisher has had charge of the paper. But in printing such a reply, we only ask that the same be sent to this paper before being handed to any other publisher. To our mind, this is only a fair and reasonable request. For this reason, and this only, we must decline to publish the last letter of Mr. E. Balston, former publisher of the *West Side*. When Mr. Balston's first reply to our article concerning the tax sale was sent us, we gladly gave it space in our columns. Imagine our surprise, therefore, when upon opening the same day's issue of the *West Side* we found the same letter printed in full in its columns. Last Friday noon, three hours after the *OBSERVER* had been mailed, another letter addressed to us was received from Mr. Balston, with the request that it be published. In the same day's mail came the Independence paper with the letter printed in full. The *OBSERVER* has no objection to giving Mr. Balston's replies the widest possible publicity, but it seems to us that simple courtesy would demand that any letter intended for publication in the *OBSERVER* should be given to this paper first. We are certainly entitled to give such letters their first presentation to the public, instead of
