GALLON HOUSE TRIAL

Victor Gross and W. A. Butler
Bound Over to May Term of
Circuit Court.

The first move toward suppressing
the notorious gallon houses near the
Grande Ronde agency in Polk county
was made in Justice Holman's court
this afternoon, when the proprietors
were arraigned for a preliminary
hearing. A large number of citizens
of Douglas precinct were present when
the testimony was taken, as the inter-
est in the crusade against these pub-
lic nuisances is very deep in that
neighborhood.

The cases against D. E. Emmett
and A. Flynn were dismissed, since
Emmett retired from the business
about six weeks ago, and Flynn, after
having moved his establishment from
the Grande Ronde neighborhood to
Gooseneck, gave up the business
entirely a short time before he was
arrested along with the three other
men.

Victor Gross and W. A. Butler
waived examination and gave bonds
in the sum of \$200 each for their
appearance in the Circuit Court.

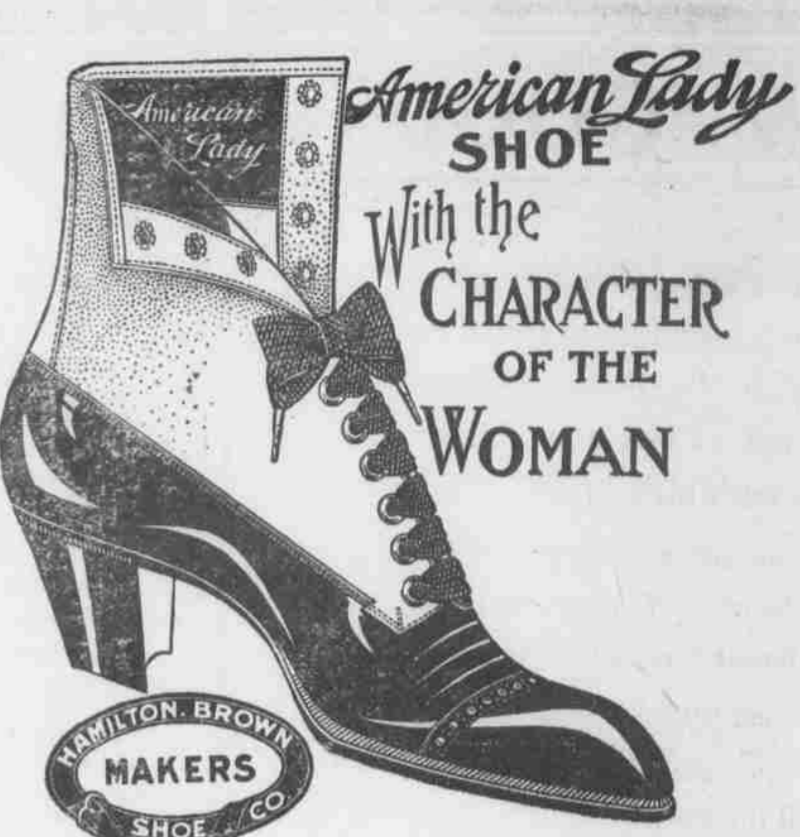
