Passes Away at His Home in Sheridan, Aged 78 Years.

Henry Rowell, an old and respected citizen of Polk county, died at his home in Sheridan, Wednesday night, after a long and severe illness resulting from an attack of apoplexy which he suffered over a month ago.

Mr. Rowell was about 78 years of age at the time of his death and had been a resident of this state for nearly 50 years, having spent the greater part of that time in Polk county. Several years ago he moved to Yamhill county, where he lived until the time of his death.

He is survived by a wife and ten children, the majority of whom reside in Polk and Yamhill counties. The funeral of Mr. Rowell will be held from the family home this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge of which he was a member of long standing.
