NO ONE IS DECEIVED.

Governor Chamberlain, in his anxiety to catch Statement No. 1 Republican votes, sets up the claim that he is the original Statement No. 1 champion. What was he doing for that principle before the primaries, when it was a whole lot less popular than it is now and really needed friends? He was as mum as an oyster. Instead of going openly before the people as a candidate and lifting his voice in favor of the election of Senators by a popular vote, he sat in his office and waited to see how many Statement No. 1 candidates for the Legislature would be nominated at the primary. Knowing that a sufficient number of voters of his party would write his name on their ballots to give him the nomination, he held himself in a position where he could accept or decline that nomination after he had seen how Statement No. 1 had fared in the primaries. Finding that it was popular and that its advocates would probably lack only one or two votes of a majority in the next Legislature, he accepted the nomination and jumped into the race, announcing himself as the original Statement No. 1 advocate. Had the Statement been defeated in the primaries and had only a bare handful of its candidates been nominated, Politician George would have refused the nomination and continued to warm the Governor's chair, leaving Statement No. 1 to take care of itself.

Governor Chamberlain's whole course in the present campaign has been that of a political demagogue—a mere seeker for office, caring nothing for principle and willing to resort to any subterfuge to deceive Republican voters, without whose aid he knows he will be defeated by 30,000 votes. If the Observer mistakes not the temper of the people of Oregon, they will not permit themselves to be fooled by the wiles of this professional office-seeker, but will rally to the support of H. M. Calk, the man who honestly and sincerely believes in Statement No. 1, and who had the manhood and courage to come out boldly for that principle at a time when it really needed a friend and champion.

The Statement No. 1 Republicans are not in the least worried as to Mr. Calk's loyalty to that principle. The only place where there is worry is in the mind of the editor of the Portland

Journal. The efforts of the Journal to find some reasonable objection to the Republican candidate for Senator are amusing. It cannot question Mr. Calk's Republicanism, and it does not dare to boast of Chamberlain's Democracy. All it can do, in its efforts to pull the wool over the eyes of the voters, is to tout Chamberlain as a Roosevelt Republican and pretend that Calk has abandoned Statement No. 1. The truth is that Chamberlain is a Bryan Democrat, and that Calk is standing exactly where he has always stood in reference to the election of Senators by a direct vote of the people. The Republican voters fully understand the situation, and will not permit themselves to be blinded by the Journal's sophistry. The nomination of Mr. Calk smokes that paper out of its Democratic hole, and it is no longer able to pose as an Independent journal. Its frantic efforts to find some argument against Mr. Calk's stand on Statement No. 1 have proved to the voters that it is not so much interested in the success of that principle as in the election of George Chamberlain, Democrat.

The Falls City News changed owners this week, C. L. Starr selling the plant and good will of the business to B. S. Billings, a recent arrival from Ohio. The News is a live and enterprising paper and is building up a thriving business in Polk County's prosperous lumber town. The paper was greatly improved under Mr. Starr's management, and his only reason for selling is that his duties as Secretary of the State Normal Regents require his whole time and attention. His successor is a wide-awake business man, and the Observer bespeaks for him the hearty support and encouragement of the good people of Falls City.

Please let Mr. Calk run on his own record, not on the president's.—Albany Democrat. But isn't Chamberlain claiming to be a better Roosevelt man than Calk or anybody else in Oregon, and is he not trying to boost himself into the senate through his declarations for Roosevelt policies, while at the same time he is logging for Bryan as a presidential candidate? When it comes to political acrobatics Chamberlain is certainly the whole show.—Eugene Register.

POLK'S FINE RIFLE RANGE

Oregon National Guardsmen Want Grounds Improved and Made Permanent.

Since the establishment of the state military rifle range across the river in Polk county there has been some agitation in national guard circles as to whether it should be kept at Salem permanently.

The state has gone to the expense of leasing a strip of land, having pits made and installing therein eight target racks. The pits were graded out in clay and the rains have in several places done considerable damage to the grading by washing down the embankments and walls, making it not altogether safe for target tenders.

The location of the range is excellent and provides an almost perfectly level stretch of 1500 yards with the side of the large hill to shoot into, thus making that part absolutely safe to those not directly interested in the target practice work.—Salem Statesman.
