

**Farm Irrigation.**  
The station has demonstrated that irrigation by use of a centrifugal pump and traction engine is too costly an operation to be practical for the western farmer; also that the area to be irrigated in that manner must necessarily be too small to include general farm crops, the work demanding undivided attention just at the busy harvest season when labor is most expensive. However, for small fields of alfalfa, potatoes, fruit and garden, irrigation by the aid of pump or well, with windmill or gasoline engine power, can be conducted with very good results. And it is reasonable to suppose that the pumping of water on to the land in later winter, when the soil is dry and opened by numerous cracks and when labor is plentiful and correspondingly cheap, will accomplish no little benefit to subsequent summer crops that could thrive on the stored up moisture. The summer irrigating, demanded when both time and labor are most valuable, might be dispensed with. In the primary tests of this plan all crops responded favorably, alfalfa particularly so.—Kansas Experiment Station.

**Horseshodish For Home Use.**  
Horseshodish may be grown very easily for home use as follows: It requires a soil similar to rutabaga. Prepare the rootlets from seed or from the branch roots of any good horseshodish cut into lengths of three to six inches and plant upright firmly in the soil with the top of the cutting even with the top of the ground. Cuttings the size of a lead pencil are preferred. These may be planted in a row or rows six inches apart in row and far enough apart to hoe or cultivate easily.—Farmers' Garden.

**For Choice Turnips.**  
Turnips should be grown in drills, like beets, for the early crop. The young plants will stand light frosts. Choose a rainy day for planting if practicable. Cover the seed very lightly. Thin the young plants to five to seven inches in the row. Sow every two weeks if a constant supply is desired, as turnips rapidly become hard and woody in warm summer weather.

**Good Varieties.**  
In horticultural tests varieties at the New Jersey station the best yields thus far are the Palmetto sparrows, Eldorado and Erie blackberries, Red Dutch and Victoria currants and Downing and Houghton gooseberries.

**The Consumer's Error.**  
The consumer is often to be blamed for the milk souring quickly. First class milk left at his house in a clean bottle and at a low temperature may be sour or off flavor twelve hours later because it was left standing in a warm kitchen for a few minutes or was poured into a pan that had been washed in the dishpan and wiped on a towel that had done service for all kinds of dishes for several days. Also milk should not be left standing in the sun a minute after the milkman leaves it.

**Onion Land.**  
Land that has grown any crop requiring high culture and heavy manuring and is free from weed seeds will generally grow good onions. Some times onions are raised on newly cleared woodland or prairie soil with great success simply by sowing the seed broadcast and harrowing it in. But this is seldom attempted.—Green.

**Keep It in the Bottle.**  
Bottled milk, being sealed with a cap, cannot absorb odors and should be left in the bottle until used, not emptied into an open dish.
