Leonard died at her home in Monmouth, Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock at the age of 63 years, her death being due to a long and severe attack of pneumonia. Mrs. Leonard, whose maiden name was Phoebe Ireland, was a daughter of one of the prominent pioneer families of Oregon. She was first married to Frank Maggart, and after his death she married Charles W. Leonard, who survives her. No children were born to either union. The funeral will be held in the Christian church in Monmouth this afternoon at 3 o'clock and the remains will be buried in the Knights of Pnythias cemetery.
