ANOTHER INJUNCTION FILED

Saloon Men of Independence Would Set Aside Recent Local Option Election.

Hon. B. F. Jones, of Independence, was in Dallas this morning and filed an injunction to prevent the County Court from taking any further steps toward enforcing the prohibition law, recently passed by the voters of Polk County, within the corporate limits of Independence. The case will come up before Circuit Judge William Galloway in Salem tomorrow for hearing.

The contest will be made along similar lines to those used in securing the Medford injunction, it being claimed that the charter of the city of Independence was passed after the state prohibition law had been enacted, and that the state law is nullified as far as that particular locality is concerned, by certain provisions of the charter which place the regulation of the sale of liquor entirely within the jurisdiction of the city.
