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SERIOUS FIRE IN MONMOUTH
Residence of Mrs. Henry Butler Totally Destroyed—Insurance Partially Covers Loss.

The residence of Mrs. Henry Butler, in Monmouth, was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon, scarcely any of its contents being saved. It was insured for \$2,500, and it is thought that this sum will cover a large portion of the loss.

Several of the young women who are attending the Summer Normal had rooms in the house, and nearly all of their books and clothing were destroyed. Miss Nola Coad and Miss Allie Fuller, of this city, were among the roomers, but were fortunately able to reach the house within a few minutes after the fire was discovered, and succeeded in saving nearly all of their belongings with the exception of their school books.

It is not known definitely how the fire was caused, but it is supposed to have been started from a defective electric wire. Mrs. Butler was prostrated from the shock, and has been quite ill since that time. Her daughter, Mrs. C. V. Teats, of this city, is in Monmouth at her bedside.
