MARSHFIELD, Or., July 19—News reached here today that August Heimling, a prominent business man of Marshfield, was shot and killed near Corbin, Curry county, while hunting. While stalking a deer one of the party mistook Heimling for the deer and fired. Heimling was killed instantly. The foregoing paragraph in yesterday's Oregonian under the heading "Mistaken For a Deer," marks the beginning of the pitiful tragedy of errors without which it seems practically impossible for the summer hunting season to pass. Every year repeats the grim story with but little variation save in the list of the victims' names, and yet such an accident should be easily avoidable. In almost every case where a man has been shot in this way, it has developed later that the slayer fired blindly, and impulsively, not seeing his victim clearly and rashly jumping at the conclusion that the object that appeared indistinctly moving among the underbrush was indeed a deer. Experienced hunters seldom make this fatal error. Long training has taught them caution. It is usually the novice who learns by bitter experience the lesson of the too frequent results of a hasty and carelessly fired shot. When such as these at last adopt the rule never to fire until they have ascertained to a certainty what they are shooting at, even though in so doing they may run the risk of allowing their quarry to escape, the familiar heading "Mistaken For a Deer" will disappear entirely from the columns of the newspapers.

WASTE CAUSES SHORTAGE

Carelessness in Irrigation Responsible For Reduction of Reserve Supply of City's Water.

During the past three weeks complaints of threatened water shortage have been frequent in Portland, Newberg, McMinnville, Dallas, and a score of other places in the Willamette Valley. To nearly every case the cause assigned is not a falling off in the supply of water, but the increased and wasteful use of water in irrigation.

The supply of water carried to our reservoir from the intake at Canyon Creek is practically as large and steady as ever, but the thoughtless waste of water by many of the citizens reduces the reserve at times until there is scarcely enough remaining in the reservoir to furnish adequate protection in case of fire.

A large portion of the waste is due to leaky toilets, but the comparatively small stream of water issuing from the outlet of the sewer does not account for it all. The loss is in a large measure due to faulty and leaking faucets, and still more to the lavish and unnecessary use of water in irrigation. It has been estimated that the lawns and gardens of the city on which water is being used continuously, could be maintained in just as good condition as they are now in, with about half of the irrigation they are receiving.

Concerning the useless waste of water in irrigation, the superintendent of the water company has remarked that because the company allows irrigation during certain hours there is no reason why everybody should open their hydrants and allow them to run at their full capacity during the whole of the irrigation hours, whether their lawns are in need of the water or not. He urges that if the citizens will take the pains to shut off the hydrants as soon as sufficient water has been used, their lawns may be maintained in just as good condition as ever, without the enormous waste that is being occasioned by the careless habit of allowing the water to run right on through the whole of the irrigation hours, regardless of whether it is needed or not.

Woodman Will Build Hall.

Attorney Oscar Hayler attended a meeting of the Woodman lodge in Falls City, Saturday, held for the purpose of making preparations for securing a Woodman hall in that city. The plan favored by the most of those who were present was to organize a stock company for the purpose of acquiring land and erecting a suitable building. In connection with the Woodman hall proper, the same building is to be occupied by a theater, and several store rooms, on the rental of which the company will rely mainly for its revenue. The members of the lodge are engaging in a canvass preliminary to the organization of the company, and are meeting with excellent success, all of the business men of the city taking an active and enthusiastic interest in the enterprise.
