YAMHILL'S BOAST.

Among the many echoes of the Salem Cherry Fair which have been tossed backward and forward by the press of Oregon during the past ten days, one of the most unaccountable and most continually recurrent comes from Yamhill county in the form of an arrogant claim that she, by virtue of having carried away the Grand Prize for the best collective county exhibit, has thereby become the hub of the cherry universe, or, to put it more exactly in her own words the "cherry center of the world."

In preparation for the Cherry Fair, Yamhill county concentrated her energies more than did any of the other counties represented, in an effort to produce a perfect county exhibit, and thanks to the unremitting zeal of Mr. Lowndale and a score of his followers, she succeeded in attaining as near perfection as would seem possible to finite human power.

Every cherry in that marvellous collection was selected with an eye to its individual excellence, and the whole display, consisting of the very cream of Yamhill's product, was carefully packed by the most artistic and skillful packers in the state.

But Marion county did not compete for the Grand Prize, and the other counties practically ignored it while bending all their energies toward preparing individual exhibits. Yamhill therefore, practically without competitors, carried off the Grand Trophy, and immediately heralded herself to the astonished world as its cherry center.

And really her claim seems well founded, does it not? But let us read a little farther into the history of the prize awards on that memorable occasion. The total number of awards is listed at 55, and of these Polk county holds 35. The total number of cups awarded was 22. Of these Polk county took 14, Marion county 6, Lane county 1, and Yamhill county 1. And yet of all the counties to whom cups were awarded, Yamhill, with a record of only one against Marion's six and Polk's 14, is thus far the only county that has had the temerity to style itself the "cherry center of the world."

So when it has been really simmered down to its essence, the question resolves itself into this: In individual exhibits Yamhill was practically out of the race, being equalled by Lane county and far out-distanced by both Polk and Marion counties. All of her energies were consumed in her supreme effort to carry off a single prize. In this she succeeded, and for that success praise is due her, but not in so great a measure as she demands. Praise she deserves, and praise has been freely and unstintingly accorded her for her enthusiastic work in preparing her one crowning exhibit.

Praise for her careful and shrewd selection from the very best that she had produced. Praise for her undisturbed superiority in the art of packing it to the best advantage. All this has been unreservedly accorded her by all who had the pleasure of examining the results of her labor. But "the cherry center of the world?" Go! The cherry center of the world is not so suddenly nor so radically shifted. It lies now, as it has lain for several years and will lie for several years to come, in Polk and Marion counties, on those fertile strips of fruit land on each side of the Willamette river, within a radius of 12 miles about the city of Salem.

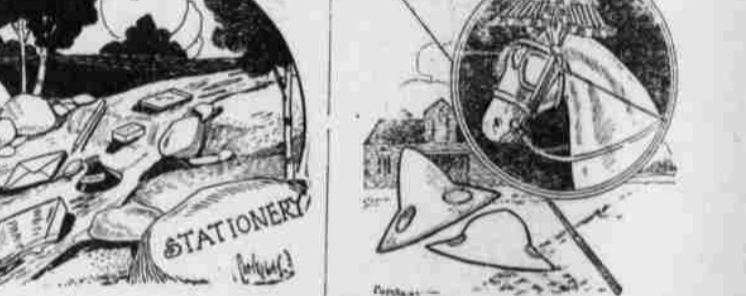
