PORTLAND, Sept. 21.—It was announced that Governor Chamberlain, of this state, the popular nominee for the office of United States senator to succeed Charles W. Fulton, will take the stump in behalf of William J. Bryan, the Democratic candidate for president.—Salem Statesman.

Glorious George! What an amazing amount of self control he has shown by keeping his sorely strained non-partisan coat on even as long as he has. Many a man would have dropped the bluff just as soon as it ceased to be of immediate use to him.

According to Senator Beveridge, Mr. Bryan has never handled a single foreign problem, he has governed no Philippines, regenerated no Cuba, built no canal, avoided no alien danger, saved us from no threatened peril. In domestic affairs, Mr. Bryan has written not one law, administered not a single department, advised no president—while lecturing at all. He is a preacher of righteousness, but not an administrator of affairs. Mr. Bryan is an Aaron, not a Moses; a Henry, but not a Washington; a Wendell Phillips, but not an Abraham Lincoln.—Albany Herald.

Within the past week several of the leading Democratic papers of Oregon have confidently declared that the "labor vote" will go to Mr. Bryan in the November election. The day of voting by the sheep herding method is, however, a thing of the past, and it is extremely doubtful that the "labor vote" will go en masse to any one candidate. A portion of it will go to one candidate and a portion to the other, while still other votes from the ranks of the laboring men will be distributed among the candidates of the minor parties. One thing is reasonably certain, however. Whichever way the vote of the average laboring man is cast, it will be cast according to the dictates of his individual judgment and not according to the instructions of the man who may chance to be at the head of the labor organization to which he happens to belong.

Those worthies of Portland whose names were so ruthlessly dragged out for public inspection by the Oregonian of yesterday's issue, as "hoppers" from the Democratic party, are now probably in an admirable condition to give a correct imitation of what the learned professor has called "the physical manifestations of impotent rage." Certain esteemed periodicals of Democratic persuasion are no doubt in much the same condition. They have been demanding "names, names" ever since the first intimation of fraud in registration was made three months ago. Now they have got what they demanded. Never was a prayer more unexpectedly or more literally answered. Now gentlemen, what are you going to do with the names you so anxiously and insistently called for?

The Polk county rock crusher is being moved from the quarry on the Burns farm near Luckiamute to Warren Frink's quarry near Falls City. Nearly 1000 yards of grading on the roads in the vicinity of Bridgeport and Luckiamute have been covered with crushed rock since the machine was moved from Salt Creek a few weeks ago, and about the same amount in the territory immediately around Falls City will be improved before the work will have to be discontinued for the winter season.

OREGON HOPS ARE BEST

Yield in This State Surpasses California and Washington in Every Respect.

The following review of the present condition of the hop trade on the Pacific Coast, from the Telegram, indicates a more successful year for that industry in Oregon than has for several months been anticipated or prophesied.

Hops are being received in considerable numbers at the local hop offices and without exception they are of almost perfect quality. The fact that Oregon has this year raised a superior crop becomes more evident every day and when the samples reach the Eastern and foreign dealers they are sure to create a favorable impression.

It is also evident from the picking and baling returns received that the crop in size will fall under the estimates made but a short time ago. The figures generally accepted now are 80,000 to 85,000 bales for Oregon. California estimates are also being lowered. Phillip Wolf & Co., of San Francisco, wired Klaber, Wolf & Nutter Friday that they had reduced their California estimate to 65,000 bales. The Washington crop is too small to cut much figure in general statistics. Even up in British Columbia the yield has been very disappointing, a report from that section stating that the Horst yards would have but 1000 bales, as compared with 3000 bales last year.

The Oregon market is still inactive, but some business is looked for in the coming week. The attitude of growers is changing significantly, the discouragement of a short time ago giving way to a feeling of bullishness. A local dealer Friday made offers of 8 cents with a large cash deposit, but was turned down.

"Electric Palace" Opened.

Messrs. Whiteside & Cooper gave their first show in the new "Electric Palace" in the Riley building Saturday night. The new theater is fitted up in the coolest and most convenient manner possible and has a seating capacity for fully 300 people. The floor is sloped so that an excellent view of the screen can be obtained from any seat in the hall and the front is finished after the manner of the moving picture theaters in the larger cities of the Willamette Valley.

Child Painfully Injured.

The six-year-old son of W. J. Lyons, of Salt Creek, was quite seriously injured Sunday by being thrown from the back of a colt which he had attempted to ride. His right arm was broken at the elbow and he sustained several severe bruises. Medical attention was secured immediately and it is hoped that the child's arm will heal rapidly and that he will suffer no permanent inconvenience from it.

E. Morris, a logger employed near Black Rock, was struck by a cable and painfully injured this morning. Although for a time rendered unconscious by the blow, his injuries are not regarded as serious.

The merry-go-round belonging to E. J. Arnold's carnival company was brought to Dallas today and together with several other features from his big show, will form a part of the many attractions at the Industrial Fair next week.

J. M. Murney, Polk county manager of the Pacific Telephone Company, was a business visitor in Dallas yesterday. Mr. Murney has recently returned from an extended visit at Newport.

The work on the concrete portions of the front of the new Williams building is nearly completed. The entire building when finished will be one of the handsomest and most tastefully built structures in the city.

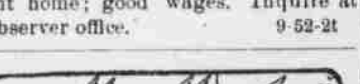
