

Begin with the calf and follow up until There the heifers become cows. should be a steady growth of body and development of dairy form qualities all of the time, summer and winter. The young animals should be kindly treated, so that they may become quiet and docile. This is the more necessary as the helfers usually take their place in the dairy at the early age of two years. There should be plenty of succulent, nourishing foods, but no overfeeding, as this is an injury to them rather than a benefit.

The Cow and Her Care. To do well cows must be made com-

fortable. To be a profitable milker the cow must be a hearty eater with good digestive powers.

In milking get all the milk each time, but do not keep on stripping after you have got it. Never use wooden milk pails.

STORING VEGETABLES.

The Best Way to Keep Them In Win-

ter. It requires care and a knowledge of the nature of vegetables in order to successful keep them through the late fall and winter. They must, as a rule, be kept in a cool atmosphere, but not cool enough to freeze. But pumpkin and squash need a dry, warm air and in gathering must be carefully handled. It is best to leave the stem long, and never store squashes until rice.

Potatoes do best in a cellar that is ool and damp and should be kept in the dark as much as possible, but there should be an arrangement for a good circulation of air. Barrels or boxes are best for car

rots, parsnips, beets and turnips. After storing in these receptucies sand or fine soil should be placed on top, allowing it to run down between the roots. The soil should be shaken down so as o fill all the spaces. In harvesting the vegetables must

be carefully handled and the tops cut off an inch or more from the top. This will prevent a chance of decay from close entting. If beets are cut too close they will bleed, losing their sweet flavor, and quickly spoll.

Onlons should be perfectly dried as soon as gathered and not allowed in a damp place. If kept in a dry room where the thermometer is barely above freezing they will keep well. Cabbage placed in a barrel and sunk

in the ground and so arranged that moisture cannot enter and then thicky covered with straw and earth will keep nicely till far into spring. But where it is intended to be used durng the winter a good plan is to cut off heads about as much as if preparing to cook and then wrap each head separately in several thicknesses of newspaper. This will exclude the air. 

MULEFOOT HOGS.

What a Kansas Breeder Has to Say

About Them. Breeders of swine in many sections of the country are greatly interested in mulefoot hogs, and these animals have attracted considerable attention in recent years when exhibited at the state fairs. These hogs are now being improved and bred under the name of Ozark hogs.

A Kansas breeder, Dr. W. J. Connor, who is raising them, says that, while in a measure they are a new thing, yet he has been breeding them long enough to have ascertained that they are actually the best range hogs in existence today. He has found, he says, that they will live and prosper where a common hog would starve to death. The meat of these bogs, he declares, is sweeter than that of common hogs, and there is a larger proportion of lean

Notes For the Shepherd.

If the pastures are short and dry look out for the breeding ewes, says

Give them extra feed-grain in a feed box, fodder corn or freshly cut clover. After the roots are gathered for win ter the flock should feed over the field to clean up the small roots, etc.

It is well to reserve a patch of turnips for the sheep to feed on. It may be in one corner of a pasture. A patch of one acre will furnish feed for twenty-five or thirty sheep for three months Do not attempt to winter old ewes. Fatten them quickly on turnips, oilmeal, ground corn and oats.

Sweet corn in the milk, fed stalks and all, is also a quick fattener for old

Do not breed young ewes under fourteen months old unless very growthy. Keep the sheep dry. Never leave them out in a cold rain, especially in

If you have no good shelter in the stures it will pay to make one. Make it deep, but provide for ventitation without drafts.


