THE FIRST YEAR'S GROWTH.

After a summer of constructive activity in lines of street and road improvement, the machinery of the county and of the City of Dallas has been stopped, taken down and safely stored away for the winter season.

To those under whose eyes the work of improvement has been carried on, the progress has been so gradual that now, when the work is allowed temporarily to lapse, they cannot readily appreciate the extent of that development that has been going on steadily and surely during the past three months.

The opinion of these is without exception unqualifiedly affirmative. Where Dallas a year ago excited considerable contemptuous fun-making from transient guests on account of the disorderly and unsightly appearance of its streets in comparison with its many other and more creditable features, the unvarying comment of the visitor who is passing through once more for the first time in several months perhaps is one of surprise and pleasure at the neat appearance of the newly built streets in the business section.

The same thing is characteristic of the recently improved roads. Men who were forced to urge their teams at a snail's pace through strips of road where the mud fairly oozed about their hubs last winter, speak of the same strips now as the best roads in the county. So much for the potency of crushed rock.

In the campaign for street improvement and road improvement, both the city council and the County Court have had to face strong opposition and bitter criticism from those who doubted the results of their efforts. But in spite of all that, it must be admitted that so far they have both made good.

Now that they have proven themselves to have been working in a good and worthy cause, those who opposed will cease to oppose and those who "boosted" will "boost" with renewed zeal and in another summer, we may look to see even a greater and more extensive development in both lines of work, than was accomplished in the summer just passed.

The jury list for the December term of Circuit Court in Polk County is preliminarily a "jury of the farming men." Out of the list of 31 names two only are designated as "merchants," two as "capitalists," and the remaining 27 as "farmer."

The change of venue demanded by Reuf has been denied and the trial will be resumed. Now, perhaps the man who has for so long been the evil genius of San Francisco, will get a taste of real justice, in spite of the fact that he declared he could not get it in that "bitterly prejudiced" city.

And William J. Bryan says that he will be willing to run again in 1912 if the people call him. And again, probably, in 1916 and again in 1920. William Jennings may be a little misled as to what really constitutes a "call" from the people but there is no denying his cheerful pertinacity. In fact his little quoadrenaline bluff has been "called" by the people every time, but William seems still inclined to sit in the game as he has a chip left.

The statement that is sometimes heard, to the effect that women are encroaching upon and usurping the peculiar property of man, seems after all to be not so very far wrong, in Oregon at least, if statistics compiled by Labor Commissioner Hoff are to be believed. Out of 23,000 women in Oregon who earn their living by toiling in different capacities, he finds the following who are employed in

work that has usually been considered the special property of laborers of the masculine gender: Bakers, 35; bank employes, 15; blacksmiths, 1; carpenters, 5; clergymen, 45; contractors, 1; electricians, 3; engineers and surveyors, 4; farm laborers, 165; hunters, trappers and guides, 25; lawyers, 10; lumberwomen, 5; painters, 5; sailors, 2; plumbers, 2; teamsters, 6; woodcutters, 2.
