CHAMBERLAIN IS ELECTED.

On the first ballot at noon today, George E. Chamberlain was elected United States Senator by the Legislature of Oregon thus ratifying the popular decision rendered in the June election.

The complete vote today follows: Senate—Chamberlain, 19; Fulton, 7; Cake, 3; Bean, 1.

House—Chamberlain, 34; Fulton, 12; Cake, 14.

Total: Chamberlain, 53; Fulton, 19; Cake, 17; Bean, 1.

Johnson, (Polk and Benton) pledged, supported Chamberlain in the Senate, and Jones, (Polk and Lincoln) likewise pledged, cast his vote for him in the house. Hawley, the other representative from Polk county, supported Fulton.

A number of Republicans who had signed Statement Number 1, voted for Chamberlain under formal protest, declaring that they were Republicans and that, excepting for the limitations placed upon them by their pledge, would have cast their votes for Fulton. It is believed however that their protest will have little effect one way or the other.

The election in the House was carried through with many manifestations of enthusiasm from the throngs of spectators, which fell as unobtrusively to the lot of those who supported Fulton and Cake as to the ones who voted for Chamberlain, McCue, or Clatsop, who supported Fulton, and Speaker C. N. McArthur were greeted with especial demonstrations. The latter declared for Statement Number Two, Republican voters choice. He remarked humorously that he had never voted for but two Democrats in his life, that both of them were dead and that he didn't want to kill off another.

FALLING LEAVES.

Twice within the past five days has the hand of death reached forth and plucked from among us two of the strong representative men from the rapidly dwindling ranks of the Polk county pioneers—A. Monroe Miller, of Dallas, and Ira F. M. Butler, of Monmouth.

While the histories of these two lives are radically diverse, the qualities of their careers and the paths in which their lifework led them being different, both go to their last reward equally loved and equally revered by those whom they leave behind them.

The course of the one was spectacular, in a way, and effective; the course of the other quiet yet no less effective. The one moved by virtue of his staunch integrity and exceptional ability in public works for the public weal; the other moved, by virtue of his equal integrity and his wholehearted benevolence, in quiet, yet none the less far reaching works for the public weal.

The departure of these two strong men from our midst and from our rapidly vanishing band of Oregon's best, her pioneers, is like the breaking out from a harp two of its strings, tuned to different melodies, perhaps, but equally resonant in the march of our state's progress as the Fate's have played it.

Year by year their number grows less and year by year others of a younger generation replace them, but during the period of their life they filled the place assigned them and filled it beyond criticism. "May they rest in peace."

It was a bitter dose for Republican Oregon to swallow but—here's congratulations George!

In placing George E. WILL FORM FRUIT UNION

Horticultural Association Plans to Incorporate For Improvement of Business Interests.

The following account from the Salem Statesman concerning the plan to organize a Northwestern Fruit Union will be of interest to fruit growers of Polk county, inasmuch as many of the growers of the eastern portion of this county are taking an active part in the work of securing its organization and a large share of the benefit to be derived from it will fall to the fruit men of Polk county:

"A committee appointed a week ago by the horticultural association to confer with the board of directors of the Northwest Fruit Association, Friday, reported favorably on a plan to incorporate under the constitution and by-laws submitted by a committee at the last meeting of the Salem Fruit Union. The plan is to capitalize at \$6000 and issue 200 party shares at \$30 each. With a part of the proceeds from the sales of the stock the Salem Fruit Union will purchase an amount of the capital stock of the Northwest Fruit Association equal to 10 per cent of the capital of the association.

"This holding of stock of the Northwest Fruit Association by the Salem Fruit Union will by agreement of the boards of the two corporations afford the Salem Fruit Union all the accommodations necessary for the packing of fruit and shipping from the plant to be built by the Northwest Fruit Association.

"A committee was appointed to solicit subscriptions of stock for the Salem Fruit Union and to report to the Salem horticultural society February 6, at 2 p. m.

"This committee was also instructed to call a meeting to secure subscriptions for stock and proceed to organize the corporation as soon as one-half of the stock is subscribed. The Northwest Fruit Association will supply the committee with printed laws for distribution among the fruit growers. The plan adopted provides for packing and marketing fruits under the direction of the local organization."
