KURIOS FROM KORRESPONDENTS
 Q. How do some bantam breeders get the small stock they have at shows? Are they dwarfed with whiskey, as are some dogs, or are they starved down?
 A. No. They select the smallest breeders, especially the hens, and hatch late.
 Q. My neighbor tells me my hens are not laying because I keep to rooster. Is this so?
 A. No. The rooster sometimes helps by sitting Hiddy to hatch a nest and cackling when the egg's laid, but you can do that yourself and save the feed.
 Q. I just bought some pigeons, and three of them have an eye with a white spot in the center. Is this natural, and will it pass away?
 A. No. The dealer has sent you three pigeons blind in one eye from coup.
 Q. What breed has largest representation at the big shows?
 A. White Wyandottes, Rocks second. At the St. Louis exposition there were 872 White Wyandottes, and no variety of Rocks reached 500. At Chicago, New York and Boston they nearly always lead. At one Madison Square Garden show there were 483 more White Wyandottes than all the Rocks put together.
 Q. Some of my Reeves pheasants have a sort of scaly leg that accumulates in large knots on their feet and legs, crippling them, and I have tried sulphur ointment, glycerin, lard and coal oil, and I fail to get a permanent cure. I read your article on pheasants, and maybe you have the cure for this trouble.
 A. Melt paraffin. When sufficiently cool pour over legs and feet and cover completely. Three applications a week apart will cure, sure.
FEATHERS AND EGGSHELLS.
 Don't let your roosters fight. It's a poor fattening process and stops the laying. A torn crest grows slowly. A torn ear lobe or wattle or injured eye may put your bird out of

the race entirely.
 One hundred pullets were given to members of a California church, the value of their winter eggs to go to the building fund. The preacher and official board will lecture on "Water and Eggs and How to Get Them," and committees will visit the coops to see that the fowls have proper care. Now, if there's nothing new under the sun, there's something new under the hen. Where next will the American hen get in her work?
 The S. P. C. A. had two dealers arrested in Philadelphia recently for picking chickens alive. The one paid \$20 and the other \$20 fine. Next fellows will get singled in the next world.
 The Fanciers' Association of York, Pa., is trying to get a bill through congress to protect racing homers. The club claims that some of its birds have been shot while passing over states where there is no protection.
 When you find yellow tipped droppings under the roost put lots of fine charcoal in the mash, and it will at once disinfect the whole digestive tract.
 Great strides were made in the guinea industry the past season. The White African is gaining on the Pearl. These birds love horses and slip in to roost on the horses on winter nights. Nice and warm for the guineas, but not so nice for the hostlers.
 Conshohocken, Pa., lately arrested twenty-five geese for vagrancy and fined their owner \$1250. The fine not being paid, the geese were returned to jail.

 FOR THE BOLTERS.
 Feed Boxes to Prevent Horses From Eating Too Rapidly.
 Many horses bolt their food, and the result is indigestion and other ills. One horseman who has animals that eat too fast has built an arrangement for the manger to overcome this, and he describes it as follows:
 "To prevent a team from eating oats too fast use a box as shown in the illustration. A partition goes from top to bottom, so each horse can be fed different amounts.
 The box is covered with hinged lid and placed in the middle of the manger if used for two horses. If only one horse needs it make half a box and put at one end of the manger. Put feed in top, and it works slowly into feed box below.
 Another horseman has an automatic feed box for the fast eaters in his stable. He says of the arrangement: "When horses bolt their feed the habit leads to indigestion and other troubles. A feed box placed on the floor having a covered compartment for feed in one end, with a slanting partition that lets it out as the horse eats it, is a splendid contrivance. Horses naturally feed from the ground. An elevated manger is a mistake. A horse box like this on the floor of a box stall is an ideal way of feeding grain to a horse."

MOLASSES FOR COWS.
 Aids Digestion and Improves Quality of Milk, Says Hoard.
 At the recent national dairy show W. D. Hoard, the well known authority on dairy subjects, advised farmers to feed molasses to their cows.
 "Cows like sweets," he said. "I feed my herd a regular ration of molasses every day, and I find that it thrives on it. It makes their flesh fat and their skins glossy. It gives zest to their appetite and helps their digestion. It increases the quantity and improves the quality of their milk, for it puts the cow in a good humor, and a good humored cow is the best milker."
 "Of course the thing can be overdone. Too much molasses is bad for the cow, just the same as too many carbohydrates are bad for Daughter Susan or too much taffy disagrees with young Bill. But a steady diet of a small quantity of molasses is a great thing for a dairy herd. My cows have got into the habit of looking for it. They don't relish their fodder without it. I feed it to them all the year around, except in the breeding season. The danger in it is dangerous them."
 "I have had occasion," continued Mr. Hoard, "to go rather deeply into the subject of the relation between the nerves of taste and the nerves of digestion. As a general thing it is true of human beings that the things they like are the things that are good for them. The same thing is true of animals. The most profitable feed for the farmer in a general way is the feed his stock likes."

Treatment of Live Stock.
 Horses and, in fact, all domestic animals are very much more impressionable than they are generally supposed to be. Cattle which have had a kind master, a man of gentle but firm nature, show the effect of their association as a breed or strain. Years of good treatment not only make an impression on the individuals, but are impressed with such force as to become a breed characteristic. In short, a keen judge can tell pretty nearly what sort of associations a horse has had by his temperament.
 The importance of creating a good temperament in a breeding season. The horse with a good temperament will do more work and do it better than one which has not got a well balanced temperament.

Blanket For Horse's Comfort.
 The horse blanket should always be ready to use after a hard day's work. A horse will chill very quickly if left standing in a cold wind. Forgetting to take the blanket along has caused many a horse to develop liver trouble that the veterinarian has been able to cure.

Vacuum For Cleaning Horses
 The vacuum machine as used for cleaning the furnishings of homes and office buildings has become a familiar sight in nearly all parts of the country. But such a machine used for cleaning horses is new to most people. A horse can be thoroughly cleaned by the machine in from three to five minutes, while with the ordinary currycomb and brush the task takes from twenty minutes to an hour of vigorous rubbing. According to Popular Mechanics, it removes all dirt on the animal's skin, treating both the surface and the pores.

BUTCHERING ON THE FARM
 In killing bees, as with everything else, the work may be made much easier by simply studying the best method to pursue and by providing suitable tools with which to work.
 One convenience that is especially essential with the present day butchering and sawing of meat and which has taken the place of the inconvenient butchering and open fire which smoked the workmen's eyes almost out is the use of a hand saw for large jobs of butchering or sheen from the pots for ordinary work. These latter arrangements are very popular and not only do they come in good service at butchering time, but as well in case of lighting out a batch of apple butter or homemade soap they do not endanger the women folks by the sweeping flames of fire often occasioned by high winds.
 When the size of the kettle to be used is determined, usually of quite large size for general purposes, a jacket made from heavy sheet iron or light boiler iron is formed about the base of the kettle at least eighteen inches from the ground and making a sufficient fringe beneath it for building a good fire. With a door cut into the front of this jacket and a place in the rear near the top fixed for a stove-pipe admit one of the handiest conveniences about the farm is made.
 This cooker can be set upon the ground in any sheltered location, or if the day becomes stormy before the task is completed it may be removed to an outdoor building or shed, where the heat may be rendered out without any smoke or danger from fire sparks, as a few joints of pipe can be added to the fire and run out through the roof or side of the shed and the work proceed as though no ill weather conditions existed.
 Only healthy hogs which have been properly fattened should be selected for butchering, as it is impossible to secure good meat from poor, sickly stock. The inside of every hog killed should be carefully examined for tuberculosis, especially hogs which have been fed on skim milk or whey from a creamery, and the carcass discarded if the disease is found in an advanced stage. The most profitable time for selling hogs is when they are from six to twelve months old, and the best pork is made from hogs of this age provided they are well fed. Pork of good quality cannot be made from scrub pigs.
 The most important thing about butchering is to get a good seal, so that the fat will be easily and quickly removed by the saws. It is better to have the water too cold than too hot, for a "good seal" can be made by an application of hot water, but a seal with the water too hot "sets" the hair, so that the skin, being cooled, will scrape off with the hair, making it necessary to shave off the hair with a sharp knife, doing a

Care of Lambs.
 An experienced breeder says that in the case of twins it is well to place them with the mother in a small, separate pen for a day or two in order that they may become acquainted and to avoid the danger of one of the lambs straying away, which may cause trouble. When lambs are born weakly more care is required, and unless the shepherd is with them to see that they are suckled soon after birth they are liable to become chilled and die. If the lamb is too weak to stand up and suck it should be held up and some milk milked into its mouth, when it will soon take the teat and help itself, or the ewe may be gently laid upon her side and the lamb brought to the teat on its knees or side and helped as above indicated.
