MEET TWO STRONG TEAMS

The Oregons Break Even in Indiana, Winning One Game and Losing Another.

Two of the hardest games that the Oregons have played since they met the Buffalo basketball team, were in Rochester and Notre Dame, Indiana, on Tuesday and Wednesday nights respectively.

The game in Rochester was won by the Oregons after a close struggle, the score at the end of the play being 24 to 25.

The western aggregation was not so fortunate on the following evening against the team at Notre Dame, suffering defeat by a score of 20 to 31. The Notre Dame players proved to be the strongest and most scientific team that the Oregons have yet been matched against. In the first half they carried the Dallas team clear of its feet and piled up a big score, leading in points at the close of the half 20 to 4. The Dallas boys rallied in the second half and, playing in brilliant form held their opponents down to 11 points, at the same time scoring 16 points themselves. Desperately as they played however they were unable to overcome the long lead of their opponents.

TO HOLD MASS MEETING

Dallas Development League Plan Big Booster Session At Courthouse Saturday Night.

Every effort will be used by the Dallas Development League to make the booster meeting called for tomorrow night in the Courthouse, by Chairman U. S. Loughary, a success in every respect.

An attendance, in which the entire citizenship of Dallas shall be amply represented is desired and the plan is to have everyone present who wishes, take an active and personal part in the meeting.

A campaign in Brownsville has met with a success that is truly remarkable, an average of \$1 per capita having been already subscribed to the development fund. The Development League believes that the citizens of Dallas are possessed of a loyalty and civic pride equal to that manifested by the people of Brownsville, of Eugene, of Albany and a dozen other towns and are relying on that loyalty in the citizens to drive the campaign to put Dallas "on the map" to a successful consummation.

The time is especially auspicious for the beginning of such an effort. Three big events are to conspire to bring thousands of people to the Pacific Coast next summer. These are the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in Seattle, the Rose Fair, in Portland, and the "Three Years After" Fair in San Francisco.

The city of Dallas and the country in its vicinity undeniably have advantages to offer which are scarcely to be equalled elsewhere in the state and while the tide of tourists and investigators from the East is sweeping this way, it behooves the people of this locality to make a strenuous bid for their attention. It is for the purpose of arranging for a campaign to give its resources due publicity, that the Development league is calling the mass meeting for tomorrow night.

Next Sunday at the Presbyterian church communion services will be held in the morning. The pastor will speak on "Concrete Consecration." In the evening at 7:30 the theme will be "Lincoln the Man."

PRaises POLK'S ANGORAS

John W. Fulton Believes Animals in This Vicinity To Be Best in The World.

John W. Fulton, of Helena, Montana, Secretary of the American Angora Goat Breeders' Association, was here Tuesday evening and Wednesday, in the interest of the organization he represents. Wednesday he spent visiting among the various large goat breeders of this vicinity, discussing plans for the entrance of exhibits of their fine animals at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition next summer.

Mr. Fulton finds conditions in this locality quite encouraging and anticipates a large representation of the goats bred in Dallas, "the goat center of the world," at the big Fair.

He is especially anxious for this to be done because, as he says, the present market for the Angora goats of this vicinity is too small, too nearly local, while the quality of the stock raised here is such that the Polk county breeders of goats should be able to look to practically the whole world as a market for their animals and their mohair products.

"At the National Goat Show in Kansas City," he said, "and that is unquestionably the most important institution of its kind insofar as the Angora goat industry is concerned, it has been the case for a number of years, that practically every breeder entering prize winning stock, had either secured them directly from this locality, or traced their ancestry to the thoroughbreds owned by breeders of this vicinity."

"There" he said pointing to a beautiful mohair rug which W. A. Ayres had been showing him, "I believe unquestionably, is the finest thing of its kind, in quality of hair, texture of the skin, excellence of finish, in fact in every respect, that I have ever had the privilege of seeing."

"If the goat breeders of Polk county would give their animals and products the wide and effective advertisement and publicity that many other commodities have received and are receiving, there should be practically no limit to the extent of their market—it should embrace the world."

Partly to bring about a wider publicity for Polk county Angoras, Mr. Fulton has made his visit to Dallas and has endeavored to interest the goat breeders in the plan of exhibiting their stock at the big Exposition so that goat men and mohair dealers from all over the world may have an opportunity of becoming familiar with them and their unquestionable merits.

Regarding the mohair market Mr. Fulton is extremely optimistic, looking forward to a marked advance in the price of mohair and its products within the next few months. He bases his belief on the general upward tendency, noticeable of late in the prices of other commodities of a kindred nature, most especially in the recent advances in wool.
