WIN THREE MORE GAMES

Decatur, Princeville and Shenandoah Defeated By The Oregons Since Wednesday.

Three basketball victories have been added to the list of Oregons' achievements since Wednesday, when they suffered defeat at the hands of the Notre Dame aggregation.

The first of these was won from Decatur, Illinois, by a score of 28 to 17. No game was played Friday night, but on Saturday, February 6, the Oregon boys wound up their stay in Illinois at Princeville, where they defeated the crack team of that city by 37 points to 25.

This week the team begun its series in Iowa by defeating Shenandoah 40 to 14. Another game is scheduled in that city for this afternoon and to night the team from Dallas will line up against Malvern, Iowa.

The boys are in excellent condition and are keeping up in exceptionally good form under the continued strain of travel and playing.
