SHIFTED-NOT SETTLED.

That hot political poker, the normal school question, that has puzzled the Legislatures of Oregon since the gray dawn of the history of the State's educational system, has been juggled quite as gingerly and unsuccessfully as of old, by the Legislature just adjourned.

The residue of the normal schools, from that protracted struggle, is about as large and substantial as the remnant of that historic snake fight, in which each reptile entirely swallowed the other, and the honor accruing to the Legislature for its solution of the puzzle, is approximately the same.

The normal school question is further from settlement than ever before and in addition, has been snarled and tangled up like an eel in a fish-line. The late Legislature, like others before it, when it saw the responsibility of the final and definite solution of the problem descending upon it, kicked up as much dust as possible and slipped from under in the confusion, leaving the aforementioned responsibility to perch on the shoulders of the legislative body that shall succeed it.

Two of the Normal schools, Ashland and Monmouth, are stubbornly refusing to play the disembodied role that has been thrust upon them and are preparing to take a new lease of life under the next Legislature comes to their aid. Of what avail their loyal and worthy efforts shall be, may not be decided until that time. In the meantime the great problem is unsolved and will likely remain so until some power raises up a Legislature big and broad enough to assume it, with its responsibility, purge out the craft of political device and pretext that has crept into it and, as a Legislature working for the best educational interest of all Oregon, settle it on a sound, efficient basis open for all. To temporize, to shirk, to shift responsibility, is perhaps more conducive to the personal political comfort of the individual member of the Legislative assembly, but such methods will never bring the matter to anything like a settlement, though Legislatures convene until the last trumpet blows.

PAVE OR MACADAMIZE?

Dallas plans to macadamize 16 more blocks during the coming summer. But before the step is irrevocably taken and the additional work already under way, it might first be well to cast a reflective eye over the spectacle of three men and a team, busily engaged in removing with a scraper the soft surface coating of mud from the streets that have already been macadamized.

It is true that the new street is more than 100 per cent improvement over the ancient liabilities that at one time went under the name of streets in our city, but in spite of that, their behavior under the stress of the first winter's traffic brings up a question whether the improvement in appearance and condition is really commensurate with the expense involved, seeing that its lasting qualities are a somewhat doubtful factor.

Behinks you, is it cheaper to build east 20 blocks of street at a moderate cost, all of which will have to be practically renewed within from three to four years, or, at an apparently large expense, to lay a substantial system of pavement the life of which is triple or quadruple that of macadam, and the surface of which is far more neat and satisfactory, both in appearance and facilities for being kept clean?

In discussing an uplift for the farmers the president recommends a larger use of the parcels post. The spectacle of 40,000 rural delivery carriers going their daily rounds with miniature loads because the parcels post rate is still 16 cents a pound would be one of the absurdities of the age.—Ashland Tidings.

GAME LAW REVISIONS

Outline Of Principal Features Entering Into New Legislation On That Subject.

The provisions of the new bill revising the state game laws and repealing all former measures, as passed in both houses last week and submitted to the governor for his signature, are briefly as follows:

Perpetual closed season for female deer.

Prohibits use of dogs in hunting deer.

Forbids the use of blinds or lying in wait on trails.

Imposes heavy penalty for mutilation of carcass to disguise sex.

Incorporates law making the closed season for elk last until 1929.

Permits the sale of ducks between November 15 and December 15. Open season for ducks from October 15 to February 15. Limit for day's shooting 25 ducks.

Chinese pheasants may be hunted between October 15 and November 15, but no females pheasants may be killed. Pheasants raised in captivity may be sold when the birds are plucked, but the sale of the game will be under the supervision of the county game warden.

Fishermen must have an angler's license, for which they must pay \$1 a year. Only 75 trout may be caught by one person over 16 years of age in a single day.

A person may fish or hunt on his own property without a license.

The bill provides that 10,000 copies of the new law be distributed throughout the state.
