FEEDING CALVES SUCCESSFULLY.

While most dairymen have their own method of feeding calves, the experience of others in this work is interesting, and quite often some valuable points may be picked up. Here is what a prominent Nebraska dairyman has to say on the subject:

More mistakes are made in feeding calves than any other live stock on the farm. First of all, the stomach of a calf is very sensitive to changes in the temperature of milk. For this reason I like to let the calf draw its own feed from the mother for three or four days. After that I pour the milk into a warm pail.

Two quarts of milk, which is ample for the average calf, will be reduced to quite a low temperature if milked and then poured into a cold pail. In winter, however, the feed pail as well as the milk should be warm. Again, the warm milk should be fed as soon as it is drawn.

is drawn from the cow and not allowed to stand or it will get cold, and a young calf must have warm milk or its stomach is likely to get out of order.

It will depend largely on the calf as to the length of time that it should have whole milk. Ordinarily this is from two to three weeks. The change from new to skimmed milk must not be made too radical, but gradually. At least a week should be consumed in making the change. This is a critical period in the life of a calf. It should not be given any more skimmed milk than new milk, for it will not digest any more, and if more be fed its stomach is almost sure to be upset. As the change is made from new or whole milk to skimmed a few dry whole oats with a little oilmeal should be given; also a little bright hay.

Where several calves occupy the same box stall stanchions should be provided to confine them while eating. They are much easier to feed, and then each one gets its share, and there is no sucking after the milk is fed. If the grain is fed as soon as they get through drinking the milk they will go to eating it and forget all about sucking, when the stanchion can be opened. The feed should be increased very gradually. Better feed too little than too much. There will be a time that the calves will not seem to grow much when they are first got to skim milk. Don't make the mistake and think that they are not getting enough and begin feeding more, for the chances are that trouble will be the result.

Calves that are intended for beef can be benefited by the addition of a little shell corn, but those that are to be raised for the dairy will make better cows if not kept too fat. I never care

to show my calves that are dairy bred before they are six months old, for the average farmer would go away with the impression that they lacked feed. For years after I began farming I could not raise a good cow. The calves always were fat and sleek, but they lacked the function of milk giving when they were grown. I was feeding unconsciously for beef and not for milk.

Feeding Whole Grain.

Bulletin 242 of the Michigan experiment station offers some exact data upon the subject of feeding whole grain to cows, heifers and calves. When whole corn was fed to cows 22 per cent was unutilized, when fed to heifers 10 per cent and when fed to calves 6 per cent. Chemical analysis showed no change in composition of the unutilized parts, so it is a safe assumption that the animal derives no benefit from grain that passes through the digestive tract unaltered.

Cleanliness in the Dairy.
There is no excuse for having sediment at the bottom of a milk vessel after it has stood for awhile. It does not matter whether milk, cream, buttermilk or cheese is the ultimate product for sale. Any dirt in the milk will ruin the chances of a successful business in either case. Cleanliness is the greatest thing in successful dairying. Have preparations made for the thorough straining and careful handling of milk in the most cleanly manner.

Clean Pails for Calves.
Filthy pails have caused more deaths to calves than a lack of food during the milk stage of a calf's life. An abundance of good milk will not compensate for filthy pails. Germs are dangerous, and a well cared for pail will be free from germs. Filth is wholly unallowable in the calf business.

Cleaning the Feet of Horses.
When working the horses in winter make it a point to clean out the feet every night with a dull knife, especially during muddy weather. This is not a hard task and will often be the means of preventing serious troubles. Many cases of thrush have started by a little neglect of the horse's feet.

The largest turkey ranch in the country is located in North Carolina, from which as high as 4,000 nicely finished birds have been shipped to market in a single week.

Judging from their conduct, a whole lot of folks seem to get on the assumption that they will reap as they sow in about every realm of life but that of weeds and morals. Observation leads to the belief that a harvest in kind is a pretty sure thing even in these departments.

Stockmen who have traveled a good deal and noted conditions report that but about 70 per cent of the usual number of feeding cattle are being carried through the present winter. If this is true, it should mean a continuation of satisfactory prices for some time to come.

Before long it will be time to sow in boxes in sunny windows in the house the seeds of plants which are going to be wanted for early transplanting. For the vegetable garden this will include tomato, pepper and egg plants and for the flower garden pansies and salvia. If especially vigorous and early plants are desired, the little plants may be transferred from the window boxes to little earthenware pots, which can be bought in large numbers for a cent or two apiece. Later, when warm weather comes on, these may be placed in the open ground, where they will have the advantage of well established leaf and root systems.

In a hearing which the country life commission held in the Twin Cities a resident of the southern part of Minnesota suggested the novel idea of operating laundries in connection with the co-operating creameries of the country, the waste steam from the boilers to be utilized for the purpose. If such a plan could be worked out, it would be an almost inestimable boon to the overworked farmer's wife, one of the chief bugbears of whose routine work is the heavy washing which has to be got out of the way every week. While the suggestion needs elaboration, it is along a need of the hour and should be given serious consideration.

A nearby reader of these notes who the past season planted ten or twelve different varieties of thoroughbred corn reports that he harvested the largest as well as the most mature and soundest crop from the yellow dent variety known as Minnesota No. 13, which has been developed, as its name implies, by the Minnesota experiment station and is especially adapted to climate conditions prevailing in Minnesota, Wisconsin and the Dakotas. In view of the fact that there grew in fields adjoining this No. 13 such varieties as Silver Mine and Reid's yellow dent, supposed to be much better yielders, the above showing is interesting and should contain a suggestion for those who have somehow got the idea that the maximum corn yield is to be obtained from the largest possible types of corn which will mature between the May and September frosts. An interesting feature noted in case of the No. 13 was its seeming tendency to overcome the handicap of a small sized ear by producing two on a stalk. During the past five years, largely as the result of a speculative desire to accomplish more than was possible and a misapprehension of seed corn suggests, types of corn have been raised in the northern portion of the corn belt which were entirely too large to mature in the growing season and as a result have spoiled in the crib. There should be a strong move in the opposite direction, and the above experience with a smaller type like the Minnesota No. 13 seems to furnish a good reason for it.

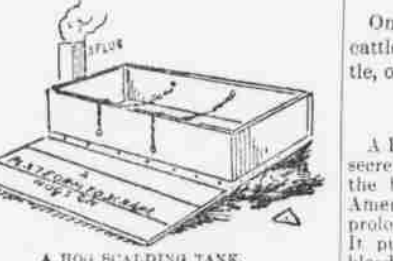
The Nebraska experiment station has recently issued bulletin No. 100 on the subject of milking machines, which may be had by residents of that state free of cost by writing to the agricultural experiment station at Lincoln and possibly to those of other states for a nominal sum. The station

installed a milking machine plant in the fall of 1909 and from experience there confirmed secured data from which a summary was made of all important points growing out of the use of the milking machine. In April, 1909, a list of questions covering the practical use of the mechanical milker was mailed to every dairymen in Nebraska who had been using the machine, and with the data above mentioned, from the subject matter of the bulletin referred to. Among the many important conclusions reached as a result of the investigation may be mentioned the following: Heifers in first period of lactation give better results than aged cows used to hand milking; some cows are not adapted to machine milking at all; with some cows manipulation of the udder is necessary before all of milk can be drawn by machine; one man operating one machine can milk about as many cows as one man milking by hand; two men operating four machines, as many cows, about twenty-one, as three men milking by hand. It was found necessary to thoroughly wash and boil the milking machine parts after each usage in order to produce milk as free from bacteria as that secured by careful hand milking. Carelessness in cleansing resulted in a filthier milk than was obtained by even poor hand methods. The bulletin closes with the suggestion that to succeed properly with the milking machine the dairymen should understand his herd of cows and should give most careful attention to details. The opinion is also expressed that the use of the machine milker would be impracticable to install if fewer than thirty cows were milked the year round.

Scalding Tub For Hogs.
For scalding hogs a barrel is commonly used, and it is all that is needed unless the hogs are very large. If very large hogs are killed a scalding tub will answer the purpose for scalding much better than a barrel. I have one which is made of two inch planks for the sides and ends and sheet iron for the bottom, says a breeder. It is six feet long and three and one-half feet wide, with a depth of two and one-half feet. Two hogs are fastened near the top on one side.
