Protective Association Meets.
The Merchants' Protective Association held its regular monthly business meeting last night, bringing up for discussion a number of plans for the improvement of its system and the increase of its sphere of action. A committee appointed to report to the city council on the matter of improving the efficiency of the fire department of Dallas was instructed by the association to submit the following recommendations at the next meeting of the city council: That the membership of the fire department be increased to 25 and that every fireman be paid \$1 for his services at a fire where it becomes necessary to unroll the apparatus and take active measures to subdue the flames. After the first two hours, if continued service is required, he shall be paid 25 cents per hour. Payments for fire services should be made by the city, paid quarterly and the names of those entitled to such payment should be subject to the recommendation of the fire chief.

The Oregon's Envisable Record.
A. F. Toner was the recipient of a letter from Carl Fenton this week, which contains some highly interesting data concerning the work of the Oregon basketball team, during the time in which they played their first 50 games. From the time they left Dallas until they played their fiftieth game in Santa Cruz, 11 weeks and 4 days elapsed during which time they traveled 9000 miles. In 50 games they scored 1700 points to their opponents' 621. The Oregonians scored on 60.9 per cent of the fouls called on their opponents, who were able to score on only 47.8 per cent of the fouls. The Oregonians had 599 fouls called on them and the opposing teams only 540. The record of baskets thrown by each man is as follows: Shaw 194 baskets to his opponents' 39; Reed 170 to 62; Fenton 184 to 35; Morton 66 to 54; C. Shaw 27 to 51; Savory 30 to 13; Teats 20 to 10; Rice 4 to 0.
