THE INDIVIDUAL'S PART.

An important part (more important than many persons would imagine) is played for the success or failure of a big celebration, by the appearance of the streets and dwelling houses of a city on the day of the event.

Hundreds of strangers are visiting the city on such an occasion, many of them for the first time, and the impression which they will form of the entertainment will be tinged by the appearance of the city as they see it.

These latter features in the Fourth of July celebration which Dallas is to hold this year will be attended to by the committees that have in charge the work of preparing for it.

Whether or not the appearance of the city itself shall contribute to or detract from the success of the celebration program which the committees will prepare and carry through, depends largely upon the interest of the individual citizens of Dallas, and upon the efforts they put forth to that end.

Every citizen who takes enough interest in the celebration to brighten up and decorate his residence for the occasion adds just that much toward its completeness and no festival can have a more appropriate setting than a city of residences properly decorated.

Such a condition gives to the event a sense of perfection or balance that will be long remembered with pleasure by all who attend it and will, for that reason, work mightily for the benefit of the city whose people are far-sighted enough not to neglect or slight these apparently insignificant but really highly important details.

If the slang phrase be permitted, it is then most decidedly "up to" the people of Dallas as individuals, if they desire to add to the committees' work, the one touch which will stamp the coming celebration as perfect in every detail, to see to it that on the Fourth of July they furnish the right setting—every house properly decorated and the entire city as beautiful and as neat as it can be.

WILL BE BIGGEST EVER

Fourth of July Committees Lay Plans for Monster Two Days' Celebration in Dallas.

The citizenship of Dallas, from the extreme of youth to the extreme of old age may now indulge in agreeable visions of two days of festivity the equal of which has not before been seen in this city, for the plans are outlined and from this date forth preparations will be rushed for the big celebration of the Polk County Pioneers' Reunion and the Fourth of July celebration, which is to be held here on Friday and Saturday, July 2 and 3.

Arrangements have already been made securing the grounds on Mill and Shelton streets where the carnival was held last year and on the campus and grounds about Dallas college. At these places the attractions of the celebration will be gathered.

Saturday, the day of the celebration of the Fourth of July, will be opened with one of the grandest pageants that has ever been witnessed in Polk county. All of the lodges, business houses, social and fraternal organizations in Dallas will participate and an effort will be made to arrange for the entry of many floats representing the lodges and business houses of other important cities of the county.

Liberal prizes are to be offered for the best floats entered and the effect of the efforts of the various parties and organizations entering in the parade will be most elaborate and impressive.

Mayor H. C. Eakin will preside over the celebration and Hon. C. N. McArthur will be the speaker of the day. The Declaration of Independence will be read by Mrs. J. F. Courter, of Falls City. Special musical features will add to the interest of the program.

The famous "Plug Uglies" without whose presence no celebration would be complete will appear in the afternoon under the direction of a competent leader and will add their merry-making to the pleasures of the entertainment.

Sports of all kinds and fast baseball games each day will keep public interest continually active. To the many local attractions will also be added the shows of Arnold's Carnival Company.

Arrangements were completed with Mr. Arnold this morning and his entire list of attractions will be brought to Dallas. Beside the tent shows which he will bring, two balloon ascensions and several other free outdoor attractions will be given.

Each evening brilliant electric illuminations will make bright the streets for the throngs of merry-makers and dancing and scores of other amusements will summon them out to enjoy themselves.

One of the finest features of all will be the displays of fireworks. Arrangements have been made to secure a set of the famous Japanese day fireworks which made such a hit at the Rose Carnival in Portland last week and these will be set off during the afternoon of the Saturday celebration.

Late in the evening of the same day a brilliant display of night fireworks will mark the close of what is to be the biggest and most complete two days' celebration that has ever been given in Dallas.
