PURCHASES FINE FARM

T. A. Moorman Farm Near Rickreall
Becomes Property of C. W.
Bowers, of Michigan.

C. W. Bowers, of Marcellus, Michi-
gan, yesterday completed the deal by
which for a consideration of \$10,000
he came into possession of the T. A.
Moorman ranch about three miles
east of Dallas, near Rickreall.

Mr. Bowers' newly acquired farm
contains about 138 acres of the finest
land for agricultural and dairying
work that can be secured in this
neighborhood. It lies on the county
highway and the railroad which is
now being built from Dallas to Salem
runs directly through the tract, assur-
ing prompt and easy communication
with the large trade centers and mar-
kets in either direction. It is the
intention of the new owner to have the
land platted into ten-acre tracts which
will be placed on sale at once. Mr.
Bowers has placed the sale of the land
entirely in the hands of H. G. Camp-
bell, of this city, who was his agent in
making the purchase and who will
have the management of the disposal
of the property.

Preliminary Hearings Closed.

The preliminary hearings in the
Siletz homestead cases which have
been held in this city recently, were
closed Monday and as soon as Attor-
ney W. L. Tooz, Jr., who has been
