Breeders of Three States Hold Meeting in Dallas.
The Oregon Angora Goat Show will be continued. This course was decided upon at a meeting of the leading breeders of the Northwest in Dallas last Saturday afternoon, at which time it was unanimously voted to hold a great Angora show in Dallas next Fall, the date to be decided later.
Representatives from most of the goat centers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho were present at Saturday's meeting. Addresses were made by U. S. Grant, President of the National Mohair Association; W. A. Ayres, William Riddell, Alva L. McDonald and other prominent breeders on subjects of interest pertaining to the industry.
Plans looking to the organization of a permanent association of all growers in the Northwest were thoroughly discussed and committees were appointed to carry them into effect. The objects of such an association will be to promote the goat industry; to get the breeders in a position where concerted action can be taken on all matters affecting the industry; to secure adequate recognition of needs from legislatures and state officers; to provide for a comprehensive plan of publicity; to collect statistics and data for the purpose of disseminating information concerning this profitable branch of the livestock industry in the Northwest; to hold Angora goat conventions; to hold annually an Angora goat exhibition, and in general to contribute to the prominence of the great Northwest as an Angora breeding center.
Officers were elected as follows: G. W. McNeil, of Dallas, President; E. L. Naylor, of Forest Grove, Vice-President; Alva L. McDonald, of Portland, Secretary and Treasurer.
A Board of Directors was chosen as follows: W. A. Ayres, Dallas, Oregon; J. Hanks, Ellensburg, Wash.; B. E. Gwinn, of Oakland, Oregon, and one to be elected by the board from Idaho.
The convention was harmonious throughout and it was the most enthusiastic gathering of goat men that has ever been held in this part of the country. An intense and earnest discussion was manifest to get together and work for the upbuilding of the Angora goat industry.

Skating was indulged in until 10 o'clock, when a delicious lunch was served by the young ladies. COURT FIXES RATE OF TAXATION AT 10.6 MILLS.
Total Tax Will Be About \$10,000 Less Than That of Last Year.
Polk County's tax levy for the year 1910 will be 10.6 mills. This levy was decided upon at an adjourned meeting of the County Commissioners' Court this morning. Judge Cond and Commissioners Riddell and Teal being in attendance. The levy is an even five mills lower than the levy of last year. It is divided as follows:

The total amount of money to be raised by taxation this year will be about \$10,000 less than was raised in 1909.
WILL ORGANIZE SOON
Glen O. Holman Perfects Plans for New Association.
An organization known as "The Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers" is a new society which proposes to gather its membership among those whose ancestors resided in the Oregon country prior to the admission of the state to the Union. The primary organization was effected at the home of W. M. Kaiser in Salem. The moving spirit is Glen O. Holman of Polk County, and it is understood, Mr. Holman had carefully outlined his plans and discussed it with others before launching the organization. At the meeting, the preliminary plans were discussed and a committee appointed, including Associate Justice Thomas A. McBride, Perry Raymond and W. M. Kaiser, to draft a constitution and by-laws. At some later date a meeting will be held, at which time an effort will be made to secure the attendance of those eligible from all parts of the state and organization effected.
Those whose parents came to Oregon prior to the admission of this state in 1859 are eligible to membership. It is believed that the new organization will have the sanction of the Oregon Pioneer Association, for its purpose is primarily to keep fresh the memory of the achievements of the early pioneers long after they have passed on and out.
