

GOOD GYPSUM ROAD.

Successful Experiments With the Mineral Made by Kansas Experts.

W. S. Gearhart, state highway engineer of Kansas, who recently returned from an inspection tour through the southwestern part of that state, says the county commissioners in that part of the state believe in permanent roads and permanent bridges.

Mr. Gearhart is well pleased with the results of the experiment in road building through the sand hills near Garden City.

"Little more than a year ago," he said, "the commercial club and county commissioners requested the office of public roads to send a man out to investigate possibilities of improving this road. Mr. Spoon, the sand clay expert, made them a visit and found that there were large deposits of gypsum all along the road. Tests were made on the gypsum, showing that it would make a good binder for the sand. The people decided to construct 700 feet of road under the direction of Mr. Spoon, and it was so satisfactory that they have now finished six miles of road at a total cost of \$5,000. The 700 feet constructed is a smoother now than the remainder because the sand and gypsum were thoroughly mixed by plowing, disking and harrowing. The remainder was constructed by placing six inches of gypsum on the sand for a width of twelve feet and then a few inches of sand were placed on top of this and left for the traffic to do the mixing."

"It requires about two years to get a road in first class condition when constructed in this manner, but it is much cheaper than the other construction. Hot, dry weather is the worst enemy of this type of road, but despite the drought it is now in excellent condition and compares very favorably with the best macadam roads. The surface is hard and smooth and shows no signs of wear."

"The only complaint any one has to make is that the road is so smooth that locks must be placed on the wagons so that they can be safely taken down the hills. Some still refuse to get a lock and in going down drive with one wheel out in the sand and the other on the hard road. One year ago, a sand and gravel road was so bad that people living ten miles south of Garden City, just beyond the hills, hauled their grain forty miles south to a railroad station, while at present grain and produce are being hauled twenty-eight miles north to Garden City."

"It is a place to go to be shown if one has any doubt in his mind about the possibility of successfully constructing a sand, gypsum or clay road."

ROAD REPAIRER ENJOINED.

Physician Who Tried to Improve Highway Served With Injunction.

Widespread interest has been created in good roads circles in the case of Dr. Donald McCaskey of Wiltmer, Pa., who has been restrained from making further improvements to the Wiltmer road, a much traveled thoroughfare of East Lampeter township.

The physician, after failing to get the road supervisors of his local township to fix a dangerous and unkept half mile of yellow clay roadway, in desperation and at his own expense began to make repairs to the road himself. The doctor built King road drag and hired horses from farmers throughout the community who would repair anybody to repair the road for him, the physician drove the team and rode the drag himself. Occasionally a small boy was taken along to stand on the drag for ballast.

After fifteen hours of strenuous labor distributed over a period of six to eight weeks after each rain the neglected byroad was transformed into a substantial highway. All that was used was the simple wooden instrument termed the split log drag, which can be made by any farmer out of a log or a few boards.

The physician's efforts worked such a transformation in the minds of the incredulous inhabitants of his community that the road drag met with popular favor, and the road officials began to be critically censured for their alleged inaction to fulfill the duties of their office.

They promptly secured an injunction restraining the physician from doing any more work of the kind, alleging that he had done this work "to the injury of the road at times and to the inconvenience of the traveling public." The case is still before the courts.

Good Roads as Memorials.

W. W. Mitchell, one of the men of means at Cadillac, Mich., has offered a bonus, said to be as much as \$300, for each mile of good road constructed in the Wexford county in the next three years. Presumably one of the principal highways leading into the county seat will be known as the Mitchell road. Whether it is or not, the aid given in the creation of a county system of improved highways will cause Mr. Mitchell to be held in grateful remembrance by future users of the roads.

State Supports Good Road Cause.

The state of Rhode Island has taken in about \$25,000 to pay this year for automobile registrations. The money goes into the fund for repair and maintenance of roads.

Good Highways in Cuba.

General Carlos Garcia Velez, minister from Cuba to the United States, says that Cuba has 1,200 miles of the most excellent macadam roads constructed of crushed coral.

HIGHWAYS IN THE WEST.

Use of the Automobile by Farmers Aiding the Improvement Movement.

Road improvements in the West, already noticeable to a slight degree, are sure to follow when the farmers of that section awake to the realization of their condition as compared with some of those of the east. Nothing will arouse the farmers to this so much as the use of the automobile, and it will be the more general use of the car by the farmer that will result in better roads.

In sections where farmers are using cars to any extent road improvements are already noticed, but there is still room for more, and more there will be in the near future. Motoring is most enjoyed on good smooth roads. Farmers owning cars realize this as well as any, and not only are they bestirring themselves toward appropriations for good highways, but are in many cases furnishing the labor necessary for road betterments.

In some farming sections of the west automobile owners can be picked out by a glance at the roadway in their immediate neighborhood. Near their homes, where sections have

been smoothed off and soft, slippery roadways resurfaced. Each farmer seems to take interest in the road near his own home. When more farmers have cars, and they are buying them rapidly, there will be more short stretches of perfect roads, and at some future time, not far distant, the stretch will be unbroken.

FERRO CEMENT ROADS.

France Trying Experiments With Highways Made of This Material.

Ferro cement roads are being experimented with in France. The substance is made of cement mixed with straw. To make a slab or block of ferro cement a mass of iron straw is placed in the mold, and there is poured over it a cement sufficiently fluid to penetrate into all the interstices of the iron and completely cover it. When the whole has set, the core of iron thus intimately incorporated gives to the block a great resistance to breakage and to trituration. At the same time, furnishing elasticity to compression which enables it to stand superfluous shocks. A brick of ferro cement one and three-fifths inches thick has supported during crushing tests a pressure of about sixty-five tons to the square inch. In breakage tests the resistance was quadruple that of ordinary cement. Resistance to wear was no less remarkable.

The Use of Wide Tires.

As to the desirability of the use of the wide tires there can be no question. The most casual observation will suffice to convince any one of the damage which a heavily laden wagon equipped with the ordinary sharp, rounded, narrow tires will produce on any road. There is also another and perhaps even greater advantage to be gained by the use of wide tires—namely, the increased hauling capacity at hand.

Picking and Packing Apples.

The harvest of the apple is here and will continue for some weeks. Here are some suggestions that may assist the growers:

Pick into baskets. They should be about half filled and loaded, and packed in boxes. The baskets should be smooth on the inside—that is, free from strips around the inside or bottom, lined with burlap to prevent bruising, and a short iron hook should be attached to the handle to suspend the basket from the limb, so as to enable the picker to use both hands.

The great advantage in using the basket lies largely in the fact that if

the apples are carefully placed in the same they are not bruised.

Apples picked from the table and immediately placed in storage (if they are to be put into cold storage) will give by far the better results. This method adds two to four months to the keeping qualities of the fruit. You cannot afford to let your fruit lie under the trees or in a building for two or three weeks before you barrel it.

Fruit grown in a warm latitude or harvested during a warm September or October must be quickly handled. But when properly handled at picking time there will not be much room for complaint. A good barrel is essential if you wish to store your fruit, have it keep well and sell. A tight barrel is the best, and the better it is made the better results you will have. There will be less loss from shrinkage of fruit, from rats and mice and other causes.

In bagging balled apples to the car and in shipping lay the barrels on the side. Never stand them on end if you wish the fruit to remain tight in the barrels.

Keep Celery Growing.

Celery should be kept growing rapidly and without interruption. A check in growth will often make the plant go to seed instead of producing edible stalks.
