WILL NUMBER HOUSES

LONG NEEDED CONVENIENCE IN DALLAS NOW UNDER WAY.

Handsome Name Plates Will Be Put Up at All Street Intersections.

Dungan & Holman, to whom the contract for putting up the street name plates and house numbers has been awarded by the city council, completed their survey of the business district yesterday. The survey is on a unit basis, a number being allotted to each 20-foot space. The city ordinance provides that all numbers must be of white enamel on a blue background. The order for these numbers was forwarded to the factory by Dungan & Holman yesterday and will be delivered to the property-owners about March 1. The street name plates are to be of the same design—white enamel on a blue background.

Street name plates and house numbers for Dallas have long been advocated by the Observer as a necessary convenience in a town of this size. Such an improvement is not only up to date, but is one that is absolutely demanded by the Government before houses of delivery will be established in any town. Judging from the rate of increase in postage receipts of the Dallas office, it will not be long until the people of this city will be entitled to free delivery.

In the meantime, the new system will give Dallas a modern city appearance and will be a greatly appreciated convenience by both residents and visitors. At the present time it is often a difficult and awkward task to direct a stranger to some certain house or place of business, especially if the house happens to be one far removed from the center of town. Under the new system, the task of finding an address will be easy and the stranger will go away with a better impression of Dallas as a live and up to date town.

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WANTS MONEY BACK

J. K. Sears Complains of Freight Rate on Land Plaster.

James K. Sears of McCoy, Or., has complained to the state railroad commission on an overcharge by the Southern Pacific company for the transportation of twenty tons of freight. Sears in his complaint sets forth that during the month of March, 1909, twenty tons of land plaster were shipped to him at McCoy from Portland. This car reached him on the 12th of April containing somewhat less than twenty tons. The charges asked for the transportation of this car were paid by him under protest, as they were considered excessive. The rate charged on the car was 13 cents per hundred pounds, amounting to \$15.51. The former rate, he alleges, was 8 cents from Portland to McCoy and Perrydale, a corresponding distance and the rate from Portland to McMinnville is 7 cents. Sears's complaint also states that the agent at McCoy recognizes that 13 cents is excessive and took the matter up with the S. P. officials, who also admitted that the rate of 13 cents was excessive, but claimed that as only twenty tons had been shipped in a thirty-ton capacity car the railroad company was entitled to the alleged overcharge.—Salem Statesman.

DIED FROM EXPOSURE

Amity Man, Crazed by Pain, Wanders All Night in Woods.

Howard Thomas, a young man about 30 years of age died at the home of Robert Booth, on Upper Williams, Thursday night, from exposure while temporarily insane. He lived at Amity and was engaged with Arthur Dodge in surveying the Amity electric line. Both men were being sick for a few days. On Wednesday, about midnight, he became worse and insisted upon getting up. His attendants were unable to keep him in bed, and in a sudden frenzy he knocked one of them over and rushed from the house in his night clothes and was soon lost in the darkness. The entire neighborhood was aroused and active search for him was vigorously prosecuted, but it was some hours before he was discovered. When found he was about a mile from the house sitting on a log, but so chilled and weak from his illness that he could not recover and he died the next evening. The body was taken to Amity for burial.—Sheridan Sun.
