LONG LIFE ENDED

**rs. Virginia A. Dempsey Dies at
Rickreall, Aged 82 Years.**

Mrs. Virginia A. Dempsey died at her home in Rickreall, Saturday, February 5, 1910, after a long illness, age 67 years, 5 months and 6 days. Mrs. Dempsey, whose maiden name

Mr. and Mrs. Dempsey came to Eastern Oregon in 1885 and lived there about one year. They then returned

their old home in Illinois where Mr. Dempsey died November 15, 1887. Two years later, Mrs. Dempsey came back to Oregon and settled at Rickreall, remaining there until the time of her death.

The funeral was held Sunday morning and was conducted by the Rev. David M. Metzger, of Dallas. Burial took place in the old Burch cemetery east of Rickreall.

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
