SALEM ON NEW LINE

Wireless Telephone Station to Be Built in Capitol City.
 Salem will be included in the list of long distance wireless telephone stations to be erected within the next 12 months by the Radio Telephone Interests. At a meeting of the Pacific Radio company held yesterday it decided to include Salem in the circuit of stations between Seattle and San Francisco. The plan will call for the erection of a steel station 235 feet high upon a concrete base. The Salem station will be similar to the one to be erected at Portland and Eureka, California.

The wireless telephone is making rapid strides as is evidenced by the fact that word was received from Paris last week to the effect that two French men had been able to transmit a message by human speech a distance of 112 miles, by the use of the Radio Instruments. Stations have been erected by the Radio companies at Chicago, Milwaukee, Cleveland, Toledo, Michigan City and contract has been entered into for the use of the Metropolitan tower in New York, which is 642 feet high. The United States battleships on their recent cruises around the world were equipped with the Radio telephones, and demonstrations as to its practicability have been given through the Northwest during the last six months. While not definitely settled, it is believed that the toll rate between Salem and Portland will be ten cents for three minutes.—Salem Statesman.

CANDIDATES SCARCE

Annual City Election Next Monday Promises to Be Tame Affair.

Little interest is manifested in any quarter in the annual city election to be held next Monday and a light vote is anticipated. In only one ward is there more than one candidate for councilman, and as the time for filing nominating petitions has expired, it is highly probable that the lone candidates thus nominated will have no opposition at the polls. The candidates who have filed petitions are:
 First Ward—H. L. Penton.
 Second Ward—W. V. Fuller.
 Third Ward—E. C. Kirkpatrick and W. H. Gaynor.
 Two measures will be placed on the ballot for adoption or rejection by the voters. One is a proposal to bond the outstanding sewer warrant indebtedness and a portion of the rock crusher indebtedness at a lower rate of interest, and the other to create a road district out of the territory embraced in the city limits and to take the collection of road tax out of the hands of the county.
