HAWLEY ALSO FAVORS.

A Washington dispatch says it is believed Senator Bourne's amendment for \$200,000 to purchase or build locks at Oregon City is safe, as Hawley is committed thereto.

To those at all familiar with the situation, this dispatch is decidedly amusing, for Hawley has at all times caused the impression to prevail that the fate of the Oregon City locks rested in his hands alone. Ever since his election to Congress, he has been assuring his Willamette Valley constituents that he was just on the eve of securing the \$200,000 appropriation and rescuing the farmers from the grasp of the "octopus." He hadn't got it, mind you, but he was just "about to get it."

When Ben Jones was striving with all of his energy to get through the Oregon Legislature his bill providing for the payment of one-half of the cost of the locks by the state, he found Hawley the greatest obstacle in the way of its passage. Hawley had just been elected to Congress, but had not yet taken his seat. While the Jones bill was pending, the House of Representatives elected the greater part of his time in the Capitol building lobbying against the measure. "Oregon doesn't need to spend a cent on the locks," said Hawley. "Just leave it to me, and when I get back to Washington, I will get Congress to appropriate it all."

The weight of this protest against an appropriation may be easily imagined. Legislators who were lukewarm in their support of the bill, and who saw in Hawley's plan a prospect of the state getting off free of expense, were induced to take the Marion County man at his word and vote against the Jones bill. The opposition grew until Jones, seeing that the fate of his measure was hanging in the balance, could stand it no longer. "Look here, Hawley," said Jones, "if you will only keep out of this, we will make your work in Washington just a little less than half as difficult as the job you have laid out for yourself. With all due respect for your confidence in your ability, you will find it will be a whole lot easier to get \$200,000 in Washington than it will be to coax \$200,000 out of those Eastern tightwads who are little about Oregon or the Pacific Coast, anyway. We may consider ourselves fortunate if we interest Congress in giving anything, even if we appropriate one-half of the amount ourselves, so we only ask you to keep still and let us cut your throat in two for you." Hawley was evidently impressed with the weight of Jones' remarks, for he at once ceased his activity against the passage of the bill. Oregon appropriated the \$200,000, and Hawley soon afterwards went to Washington.

Two years passed by, and Congress did nothing. Another Oregon Legislature convened, and Jones secured the passage of an amendment keeping the old act alive for three years more in order to give Congress an opportunity to appropriate its half of the needed amount. Time went on, and Congress continued to do nothing. A few weeks ago, the House passed a Rivers and Harbors bill. If Hawley made any effort to secure an appropriation for the locks, the results of his work were not apparent, for no provision was made for the purchase. The bill went over to the Senate, and there, before the proper committee, assistance came from an entirely unexpected and unlooked source. Senator Bourne became interested in the plea of the Willamette Valley farmers and merchants for relief, and through his efforts the committee was prevailed upon to recommend an appropriation of \$200,000 to aid the State of Oregon in purchasing or building the needed locks.

The bill as amended has not yet been passed by the Senate, but there is every reason to believe that the locks item will be retained. The measure will then be sent back to the House, where, with Mr. Hawley "committed thereto," it should go through as slick as grease.

Incipient Blaze.

What might have resulted in a destructive fire was prevented by the prompt use of a garden hose at the home of Mayor H. C. Eakin this afternoon. A spark from the chimney started a blaze on the roof and for a few minutes it looked as if the services of the fire department might be needed. Prompt work with a small hose, however, soon brought the fire under control. The damage is nominal.

TO CONSIDER RATES

Dallas Merchants Invited to Attend Hearing in Salem, April 28.

The following is a copy of a letter sent to the Dallas Commercial Club by the Railroad Commission of Oregon yesterday:

SALEM, OR., April 8, 1910.

Dallas Commercial Club:

Gentlemen:—The Railroad Commission has on its own motion investigated the class rates imposed and charged by the Southern Pacific Company for the transportation of freight, in carloads and less than carloads, between Portland and points on the lines of the said company within the State of Oregon, as set forth in said company's Local and Joint Freight Tariff No. 225-A, and supplements thereto, and after making such investigation has become satisfied that sufficient grounds exist to warrant the holding of a hearing to determine whether the said rates are unreasonable or unjustly discriminatory.

It has therefore been ordered that a hearing be had on the matters and things above set forth; that after due hearing and investigation, if the commission shall find the said rates and charges, or any of them, to be unreasonable or unjustly discriminatory, it shall fix and order substituted such rate, or rates, or charges or classifications as it shall determine to be just and reasonable and which shall be charged in the future in lieu of those found to be unreasonable or unjustly discriminatory.

The hearing will be held at the office of the Commission at Salem, Oregon, on the 28th day of April, at 11 o'clock a. m., and if deemed necessary, hearings will be held at other points. All interested in the matter are invited to be present and will be given an opportunity to be heard if they have anything to offer. The Commercial Club of the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon should arrange to have well qualified representatives at the hearing.
