Water Works

For The Farm

For Comfort

No longer is it necessary for the resident of the country or suburban district to be without the comforts and conveniences of city life. The matter of comfort is becoming more and more of prime importance, and with the increasing use of the telephone, rural mail delivery, artificial illuminating gas, modern heating plants, and the automobile, the rural householder is rivaling his city cousin for the conveniences of the city without its many discomforts. No wonder the city man is turning his face to rural life.

The Water Question

There is still one thing of vital importance that has had less than its share of attention. It will often freeze and perhaps burst in winter, may blow down and cause damage to property and stock at any time of the year, and the pressure developed is never satisfactory. The water is too cold for the stock in winter and becomes hot and stagnant in summer.
