EXPERT POTATO CULTURE.

Specialist Gives Hints For Growing Tubers on Irrigated Land. One of the recent farmers' bulletins issued by the department of agriculture is written by E. H. Grubb of Carbondale, Colo., an expert grower, who says:

The improved planters of today open the furrow, drop the seed, cover it, firm the dirt over the seed and mark the next furrow. Such a planter is drawn by two horses. The writer plants the potatoes about two or two and one-half inches below the surface of the soil. Experiments with potatoes planted in rows all the way from thirty-six to forty-eight inches apart indicate that the best distance depends upon the seasonal conditions and type of soil. It is a problem for each grower to solve for himself. The distance apart the potatoes should be planted in the row also depends so much upon the variety, the fertility of the soil, the availability of water, etc., that each farmer must determine this from his own experience. I plant them eight inches apart in rows thirty-six inches apart. This gives the largest tonnage of potatoes of desirable size.

The writer's experience has been that seed of large size, two to six ounces, produce strong, vigorous shoots, and they furnish an ample supply of plant food to sustain a strong and vigorous growth until the feeder roots can take up the food from the soil.

During the last two years the best results were obtained from seed of medium sized whole roots. While the cost of the seed has been considerably greater, the stand has been approximately perfect. Experience has proved that from one or two eyes only are sprouts developed in uncult seed. The seed end furnishes a strong vine. The other eyes usually remain dormant.

One of the greatest advantages of using whole seed is the protection from disease which may be present in the soil and which may attack the more tender exposed parts of the cut seed.

As soon as possible after the potatoes are planted the cultivator should be started. This implement has four shovels, each four or five inches wide and about fifteen inches long, two on each side of the row, and is drawn by

two heavy horses. These shovels should run as close as possible to the planted tubers without disturbing them. The first cultivation adds to the depth of the dirt over the seed and permits the use of a light smoothing harrow without disturbing the tubers. The cultivator also loosens the soil on each side of the row and better fits it for the potato roots which will soon invade it.

After this the potatoes should be harrowed once a week, if possible, first lengthwise of the rows and then across, until the vines are five to six inches high.

After this the cultivator is used, but is not run so deep as at the first cultivation. Frequent shallow cultivation keeps the surface of the soil loose, conserves the moisture and gives a chance for the root system to spread.

PREPARING CORN FOR HOGS.

Iowa Bulletin Offers Valuable Suggestions to Farmers.

In the corn belt, where corn is the principal hog food and hence one of the principal farm products, the best method of preparing corn for feeding to hogs is a question worthy of the attention of every farmer. The most common method of feeding corn is in the ear just as it comes from the crib. Other methods that are often used are shelling and soaking, grinding and feeding dry, grinding and soaking and grinding together with the cob. It is estimated that it took a hundred million bushels of corn to feed the hogs of Iowa last year, according to a bulletin from the Iowa experiment station. To have shelled and ground this corn would have cost \$3,000,000. In order to find out whether or not such an expenditure would be justified the animal husbandry section of the Iowa experiment station conducted a series of experiments in which corn prepared in all these different ways was fed to both young and old hogs. These experiments, which were conducted during 1907 and 1908, produced some interesting and valuable results. The data and conclusions obtained from these experiments have been published in bulletin No. 100. A careful study of this bulletin will be of great value to every hog grower in the corn belt and give a definite basis on which to plan future feeding operations. Copies can be obtained from Director C. F. Curtis, Iowa experiment station, Ames, Ia., as long as the supply lasts.

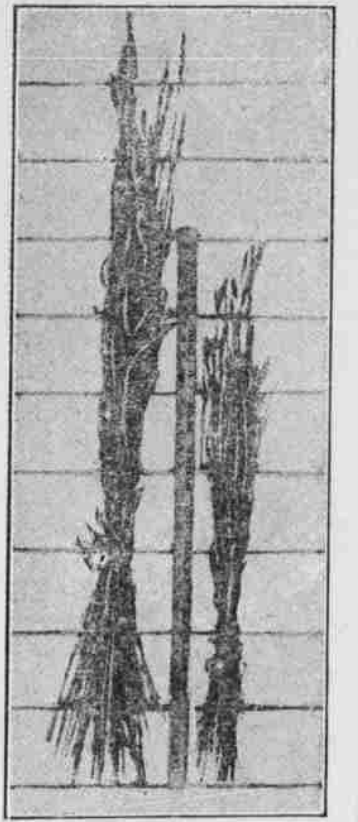

VALUE OF FERTILIZER SHOWN
Millet Crop More Than Doubled by Properly Enriching the Soil.

The picture herewith represents the value of fertilizer on sandy soil. It is a strip of land in New York that was on it at one side in 1897 with an application of about 200 pounds per acre of a 28-10 fertilizer; the other side had no fertilizer. The land was plowed and sown about June 15, 1897. The showing is remarkable, as the season was the driest and also the earliest for years, with only five inches of rain fall after July 1, which is about half of normal. The picture shows the growth of one square foot from each section, that fertilized in 1897 produced almost sixteen and one-half tons of green forage to the acre, while the



other made only 6.5 tons. There are several points to be thought of here—first, that fertilizers of a good grade pay well the first year, and then some pay for the second year with grass and clover. That millet is a profitable crop both for silage and cured is apparent when seven and one-half tons of cured fodder can be secured per acre. As millet contains only about 2 per cent of protein, it should be fed in connection with alfalfa or clover hay. If these cannot be obtained the ration should be balanced with such feeds as oilmeal, cottonseed meal or the better grades of gluten feed.

"I have used millet for some years with dairy cows and young stock," says the farmer who made this fertilizing experiment, "and think very highly of it. It is said to be injurious to horses through the effect it has on the kidneys. With the hay crop as light as it has been for two years, as the dry season has been very hard on new seedling, it will surely pay our farmers to give more attention to the millets. Any one of the different kinds can be sown after all other spring crops are in and can be harvested and out of the way before fall work begins."

PRESERVING FERNS IN WINTER
They Should Be Placed Where They Get Diffused Light.

Although ferns are greatly admired for indoor decorations, the plants are in general singularly unfortunate in the treatment they receive at the hands of their owners. It being well understood that most varieties thrive better when not exposed to strong sunshine, they are usually relegated to any shady and cold position that may be otherwise unoccupied in the house. This method of dealing with the plants invariably ends in disappointment. Although it is true that ferns do not like the direct rays of the sun continually upon them, yet a certain amount of light is necessary for their development, and instead of standing them in corners and other unfavorable places it is far better to give them the full benefit of a window's northern aspect with due care, at any rate, they should be placed where they get ample diffused light.

Another frequent cause of failure in ferns is the semi-starvation to which they are subjected. The idea is very prevalent that they do not require manure, and in consequence no one will think of manure in connection with potting them up. Certainly a soil heavily manured is not suitable for them, and fresh manure should not be used, but a reasonable amount of loam or leaf mold is, as a rule, highly beneficial.

To preserve the delicate greenness of the fronds fully full of roots. A good fertilizer, such as nitrate of soda may be dissolved in the proportion of half an ounce to the gallon and the ferns watered therewith every ten or twelve days. This is especially good where the plants are old or partly exhausted. Soft water is also very useful as a stimulant. It should be perfectly clear and is best applied alternately with an artificial fertilizer. Liquid manure of animal origin should be used very sparingly or not at all.

Treatment of the Separator.
The separator is a machine which should receive careful treatment if it is to do its best work. Foundations should be solid and the machine set perfectly level. All bearings should receive frequent oilings with kerosene. This will make the machine run easy and prolong its life. Keep the machine well oiled with the special oil sent out with the separator. Separators should be located in a clean, well ventilated place free from odors. It is not necessary to say that the separator should be taken apart and thoroughly cleaned and aired after each time it is used.
