

FIRST RAY OF HOPE

House Committee Reports Favorably on Siletz Homestead Bills.

The house public lands committee has ordered a favorable report on Havel's bill directing issuance of patent to 60 or 70 settlers on the Siletz reservation. The bill was amended to require the payment of \$2.50 per acre for land, which would have been necessary had the lands been opened under the timber and stone act. It is understood the settlers have no objection to this provision. Several other minor changes were made in the bill. Congressman Hawley's bill, which the public lands committee of the house has endorsed, is the same measure that was introduced by Senator Chamberlain in the senate, with the amendment of an acreage charge based on the old price demanded of locators taking timber claims. It is the bill that was framed by the Oregon delegation after a conference with Oswald West, who presented the case for the settlers when he was in Washington recently.

With the endorsement of the house committee on public lands, it is believed that the lower branch of congress will accept the bill, and with such prestige for it when going to the senate the homesteaders believe they can win, if either of both the Oregon senators will work in their behalf.

Will Number Houses.

WOOL WILL BE LOWER

Prospect Less Bright Than That of Year Ago.

"The sheep men of the Northwest realize clearly enough that it is less this year to expect anything like a duplicate of the wool market of the year ago," said one of the leading Portland dealers to the Telegram, "and for that reason the chances are that a very large part, if not the bulk, of the Oregon clip this season will be disposed of at the public sales. "With the sales will develop in the way of price remains to be determined, but in view of trade conditions the time to quote better than 14 to 17 cents on Eastern Oregon wool and 18 to 21 cents on Valley products. It is the general apathy of the East regarding wool that is in the main responsible for the situation here just now. News from the Atlantic seaboard indicates a lack of interest in the wool market that is something out of the ordinary at this time of the year. Eastern buyers will of course attend the public sales, but the general impression seems to be that they are not likely to inject any excitement into the market this year. In other years these buyers have usually been on the ground, buying freely and at good prices, before shearing was generally under way. This season they are holding back, and the market as a consequence is more or less depressed."

Mohair Shows Strength.

The mohair market, on the other hand, shows strength, and values are gradually working upward. This is attributed to the fact that in the manufacturing centers of the East stocks of old hair are generally well cleaned up and to the competition here of buyers for the local and Eastern mills.

Shearing is well along throughout the Valley and the bidding for the clip thus far offered has been spirited. Starting at prices around 24 cents two weeks ago, the market has been steadily raised until mohair now is quoted at 27 1/2 to 28 cents a pound. It is even reported that sales of extra quality hair have been made in the country at a price based on 29 cents delivered in Portland.

Interest in the mohair situation centers largely in the Dallas pool sale, which takes place April 16. There will be approximately 75,000 pounds of mohair offered there at that time. Other pools are to be made up at Hillsboro, Edgemoor and elsewhere for sale at later dates.
