Vanderborn Scott Dead.
Vanderborn Scott died at his home in

The funeral service was held at Hope-
well, May 4, by the Rev. A. A. Wood,
of McMinnville, and the remains were
laid to rest in Hopewell cemetery. Mr.
Scott's wife died about five years ago.
Besides his two daughters, he left to
survive three sons and two daughters.
They are Harmon Scott, of
Pallman, Washington; Clarence Scott,
of Carlton, Oregon; Mrs. Martha Ad-
dison, of Newberg; and Mrs. Elizabeth
Fishback, of West McMinnville.

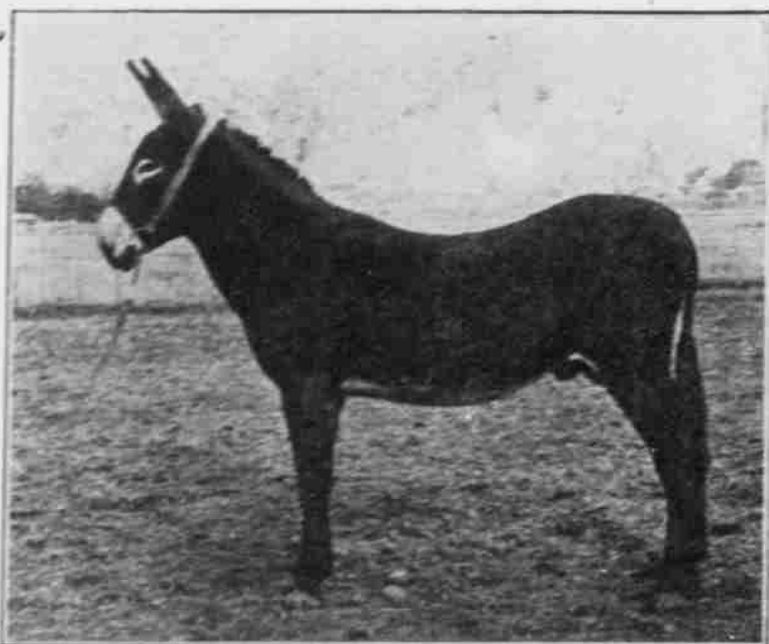
