

UTO ROAD TO COAST
The weekly luncheon of the executive committee of the Salem Board of Trade, Monday, May 17, 1910, was held at the Falls City Commercial Club, Falls City, Oregon. The committee, in which Mr. J. E. Heasley, of the Falls City Commercial Club, presided, requested action on the part of the board relative to the improvement of the Siletz road. The committee was referred to the Good Roads Association and some definite action will be taken in the near future. Many of the automobiles expressed the opinion that the road will be made passable as it is the easiest and most comfortable route to the coast, and significant willingness to render material assistance. The number of summer tourists who will take advantage of the Siletz road to the sea shore when the road is made ready for travel cannot be estimated. Doubtless Lincoln county will gladly improve the roads to meet with the Polk County road, which would profit immensely from the improvement and should be completed. The letter of Secretary A. P. Hofer of the Board of Trade follows:

Dear Sir:—Yours of the 9th inst., relative to assistance in constructing a road from your city to the ocean through the Siletz region, was read to the executive committee of the Board of Trade at its weekly meeting, Monday, May 16. After considerable discussion the matter was referred to the Good Roads Association, which will in due time report soon.
The members of the committee expressed a willingness to cooperate with your club in securing a road through the Siletz region to Newport. This road will not only be the most feasible route for automobiles, but it offers many attractive features, with our beautiful city as a delightful resort for a few days' stop-over enroute each year.

With the approach of the dry summer season, the dust nuisance is again forcing itself upon the attention of the merchants of Dallas and many appeals for relief from an undesirable condition are being heard from business men whose stocks of goods are being damaged. Investigation of the cause of existing conditions reveals the fact that not enough money has yet been subscribed to pay Mr. Coulter for his actual expense of operating his street sprinkler. Some of the merchants have so far failed to contribute. The city council has under consideration the matter of paying the cost of the street sprinkling, but it is not known how much money can be counted upon from that source. It is to be earnestly hoped that liberal encouragement will be given Mr. Coulter to this end and that valuable stock of merchandise may not only be protected from damage from dust, but that Dallas may be made a cool, clean and attractive city during the dry summer months. This result can easily be accomplished at a low cost, if each merchant will only contribute his share. It is neither fair nor just to ask a few enterprising business men to pay for the protection of all of the merchandise stocks in the city from the dust nuisance.
