

IRA A. BISHOP DIES

IRA A. Bishop died Wednesday, May 19, 1910, at the home of his sister, Mrs. W. Baker, of this city, with whom he had been living for the last two years. His death was caused by pulmonary tuberculosis, which he had contracted in Chicago while working in the printer's trade in a dimly light, poorly ventilated basement. Mr. Bishop was born in Darke county, Ohio, in 1830. He spent the greater part of his life in Indiana, where his father still resides. Besides his father in Dallas and one brother in Indiana, he left one brother in Chicago, who worked for him in health, he had been a home of his sister, who had been a mother to him. The funeral service will be held in the United Evangelical Church at 10 o'clock this morning and will be conducted by President A. A. Winter, of Dallas College.

WILL SOON REGISTER

Change of Voting Precincts Will Cause Awkward Situation. County Clerk E. M. Smith is preparing to send out supplies for the various registration officers of the county. The registration books will be opened June 7 and will close on September 15. After the primary election, the books will be opened, and registration will continue until about October 15. A conflict between the registration law and the law providing for the creation of new voting precincts will cause an awkward situation in Polk County this year. The registration law provides that the books must be opened June 7, and that each election must give the name of his voting precinct. All changes of boundaries in voting precincts must be made at the July term of county court. As it will be necessary to create several new precincts in the county this year, it will be seen that many voters will not know how to register properly until after the court has held its July term. The only way the officers see out of the difficulty at the present time is to request the voters living in precincts which are to be changed to postpone registering until in July. Three New Precincts. The precincts which will have to be divided this year on account of the number of voters residing therein are East Dallas and Falls City. While no definite plan for establishing the new boundaries has yet been made, it is probable that Dallas will be divided into four precincts instead of three, the names to be North Dallas, South Dallas, Northeast Dallas and Southeast Dallas. The dividing lines will be Main and Court streets. Falls City will be divided into two precincts, with the Luckiamute river as the dividing line. Black Rock will be made a separate district. It is altogether probable that Rock Creek precinct will be abolished and the territory made a part of Black Rock precinct. Excursion Rates. The new Sunday rates on the Salem, Dallas & Falls City railroad will go into effect next Sunday.
