

VERNE LAUNER DEAD

Former Dallas Boy Passes Away in Salem After Brief Illness.

Verne O. Launer, of Grants Pass, formerly one of Dallas' worthy and respected young men, died at the Salem Hospital, Friday, June 16, 1910, after a brief illness of appendicitis. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Launer, and was born November 4, 1887, on a farm near Dayton, Oregon, where he lived until his parents moved to Dallas in 1902. During the years of his life, he won the respect of all with whom he came in contact by his honesty, good nature and friendly manner. He attended Dallas College, and for a time was employed in the store of the Dallas Mercantile Company. A little over a year previous to his death, he secured a position as clerk in the National drug store in Grants Pass, which place he filled acceptably to his employer up to the time of his sickness. He lived a pure and unblemished Christian life. In his early childhood he became a member of the United Evangelical Church, but later united with the Christian denomination. The funeral was held in this city Sunday afternoon in the United Evangelical Church and was largely attended by sorrowing friends. The funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Charles A. Shaw, pastor of the Christian Church. Burial took place in the Oak Fellows' cemetery. Besides a multitude of friends who remain to mourn his death, he is survived by his father and mother, three sisters and two brothers.
