CENSUS RETURNS SOON

Bulletins Will Probably Commence Coming Next Month.

The director of the census is organizing his large force of employees so that the public may know at the earliest possible moment the result of the census of the leading cities of the country. He is of the opinion that his force will be in readiness to tabulate the returns of the supervisors of the cities of the country of 25,000 or over so that announcements may be made public during the months of July and August.

Full returns from many of the large cities of the country are now in the hands of the directors and the work of tabulation is about to commence. It was said that the census of Washington would probably be the first to be announced, to be followed as rapidly as possible by cities in the order in which returns have been reported to the supervisors. The director intends to issue two bulletins daily to the press of the country carrying announcements of the results of the census taken of the cities. One bulletin will be issued daily between 6 a. m. and a second at 6 o'clock, thus furnishing "copy" for afternoon and morning newspapers. When the work is fairly started these bulletins will fall thick and fast, and even at that it will probably consume the months of July and August to complete the returns from the cities.

INDIAN LANDS RICH

Great Opportunities for Homeseekers in Grande Ronde Valley.

(Colonel Hofer in Salem Journal.)
One of the most interesting places in Western Oregon is the Grande Ronde Indian Reservation, near which is located the South of the Columbia, overlooking Cosper Creek, so named after one of the first settlers. There is now a large general merchandise store and post-office called Butler near the old Fort where General Phil Sheridan got his military training fighting the Indians in the early days of Oregon history.

The store at Butler is conducted by the firm of Flannery & Fundman. Joel Flannery is a resident of Perrydale, Polk County. Paul Fundman is one of the pioneer merchants of the store at Willamina where he was a partner of A. Kershaw, who was for twenty-three years Indian agent at Grand Ronde. Mr. Fundman is entitled to be ranked among the men who have done a great deal to develop Western Oregon.

There are still some good farming lands to be had in the Grande Ronde Country. The Indians are selling off their lands containing some of the best soil in the state. There is room for a great many more. I do not know of any part of Oregon where ranch lands can be picked up as cheaply as right around here. There are many beautiful sites for homes in this valley. On much of the land the timber is not heavy and is easily cleared. Everywhere there is fine running water and good hunting and fishing.

There is some of the richest soil in Western Oregon in the Grande Ronde country and on the reservation. The old reservation buildings are still standing and among them is a block house that was built for protecting the settlers against hostile Indians. The corners of the second story project over the sides of the first story so that the defenders of the block house were able to shoot their rifles in every direction. Some of the old buildings are still standing on the side of Fort Sheridan, overlooking the beautiful valley.

There are opportunities for homes in the neighborhood of Butler post-office. The soil here is well suited for fruit growing, and dairying. The finest grain crops, hay and vegetables are grown, and the climate is very healthy. The mountains surrounding the Grande Ronde are not high but very picturesque, and the air is delightful. Fine grazing lands extend to the tops of the hills, and valleys open in all directions.

There are good roads leading from Salem directly west to the Grande Ronde that can be traveled all the year around and the distance is about forty miles and can be reached in three hours with a motorcar.
