MARRIED FIFTY YEARS

MR. AND MRS. J. M. CAMPBELL CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING.

Have Lived in Dallas Continuously Since 1864—Both Oregon Pioneers of 1853.

Mr. and Mrs. James M. Campbell celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding yesterday by holding an informal reception at their cozy home in this city.

The house was elaborately decorated for the happy occasion. Yellow flowers, ribbons and streamers were used to carry out the color scheme of a "golden" wedding.

Delicious refreshments were served during the afternoon and evening. Fully one hundred guests—old-time friends and neighbors of the worthy couple—called to pay their respects and extend congratulations.

The hours were spent in a delightfully social way. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are probably the oldest couple in Dallas in point of continuous residence. They moved into town from Salt Creek in 1864, a few years after their wedding, and have lived here ever since.

It is worthy of note that they lived in the house at the corner of Jefferson and Academy streets from 1864 until the present year. A few months ago Mr. Campbell sold that property and purchased a lot in the block directly south, where he built a modern cottage.

Both Are Early Pioneers

James M. Campbell was born in Morgan County, Illinois, October 8, 1823. His parents, James G. and Elizabeth Campbell, with their family, emigrated from that place to Ottumwa, Iowa, in 1842, and in the year 1853 crossed the plains to Oregon.

They located on a donation claim of 320 acres on Salt Creek, in Polk County, near where the Salt Creek school-house now stands.

The family of three sons and four daughters are all living, and all have reached an advanced age. James M., Thomas J., William Green, Mrs. Amanda Frazer, Mrs. Orpha Dashiell and Mrs. Sarah Black are residents of Dallas. Mrs. Eliza Kennedy lives in Palouse City, Washington. James M. Campbell and his brother, Thomas, lay claim to the distinction of being the oldest twin brothers in Polk County, if not in Oregon.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Campbell, whose maiden name was Ann Elizabeth Hagood, is a daughter of the late Henry and Mary A. Hagood. She was born in Danville, Virginia, in 1844. Her parents moved from Virginia to Kansas City, Missouri, in 1847, and in 1853 they emigrated to Oregon. They first settled on Goose-neck Creek in the northwest part of Polk County, but later sold out there and moved to a farm on Salt Creek adjoining that of James G. Campbell.

Mrs. Campbell's living brothers and sisters are William R. Hagood, of Eastern Washington; Mrs. Tona Hill, of Pullman, Washington; Mrs. Graham Glass, of Portland, and Mrs. E. C. Kirkpatrick, of Dallas. Two sisters, Mrs. Emily Tyson and Mrs. Martha Hubbard, are dead.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Campbell are the parents of two sons and three daughters, all of whom were present at yesterday's anniversary. The children are: Henry G. and Charles C. Campbell, of Dallas; Mrs. J. W. Crider, of San Jose, California; Mrs. J. C. Morrison, of Independence, and Miss Loretta Campbell, of Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have long been faithful members of the Christian Church. The influence of their lives has been for good and they enjoy the respect and esteem of a host of friends. That they may be spared to celebrate many more anniversaries of their wedding day is the wish of all.

CHERRY FAIR NEXT

Big Show Will Be Held in Salem, July 7, 8 and 9.

Salem will hold its fifth annual Cherry fair July 7, 8 and 9. The event has been widely advertised throughout the valley with circus posters and the capital city expects to be flooded with visitors from different points in the valley from the first to the last day of the festivities.

Many attractions have been scheduled, including E. J. Arnold's show, five bands, many elaborate and magnificent parades and sporting events.

A contest is now on for queen of the festival. The successful candidate for queen will be crowned on the morning of the first day, when the big parade of decorated carriages and automobiles will take place. From then until the confetti throwing on the last night of the fair, joy will be unconfined. The five bands that have been engaged for the three days are the Victor Point band, Chemawa Indian band, Reform school band, Arnold's band and the Salem Military band.

Among the other features of the show will be a comic parade, which will take place Saturday and the regatta of the Salem Canoe and Athletic club on the river Friday evening.

The cherry exhibit will be housed in a large canvas pavilion on Church street between the postoffice and the courthouse. There will be exhibits from Linn, Lane, Benton, Polk and Yamhill counties, and the indications are that the competition between the valley counties for the sweepstakes trophy this year will be keen. Marion county does not compete with the other counties for the sweepstakes cup. There will also be lectures on horticulture each afternoon and evening by instructors from the Oregon Agricultural college.
