ST HONORS GO TO KIMBALL EXHIBIT AT CHERRY FAIR.

Hardists of Eastern Polk Capture Practically All First Prizes at Big Salem Show.

As usual, the farmers of the Polk county in Eastern Polk County won practically all of the prizes at the Cherry Fair. B. P. Kimball, owner of the Grand Prize, had an exhibit which the Salem Statesman deemed to be "the best display of cherries ever seen in Salem," and one which probably outclassed anything seen in the cherry line in Oregon. The Salem show was successful from viewpoint this year and was more than highly satisfactory to the upprising business men who produced it. The Capital City was swayed with visitors all three days. Hardists were in attendance from Polk county in the valley, and Portland an excursion of its leading estate merchants and business men led the cherry exhibit.

Council Holds Adjourned Meeting.
The city council held an adjourned meeting last night and transacted considerable business of importance.

The assessment for street improvement on Main and Washington streets was levied and apportioned and notice was ordered served on the property owners of the action of the board.

The pipe line at the city rock quarry was ordered changed so as to afford a sufficient water supply for the crusher engine.

The city sewer outlet bonds, to the amount of \$4000, were sold to W. A. Ayres, his being the only bid received. The bonds will bear 6 per cent interest, the city finding it impossible to place the bonds at a lower rate.

The street commissioner was ordered to change the grades in the macadam district, as provided by the recent ordinance.

NEW BRIDGE IS READY

WEST SIDE TRAINS WILL SOON CROSS AT OSWEGO.

Four New Stations Established on Beaverton Cut-off; Freight Rates to Be Reduced.

The big Southern Pacific bridge across the Willamette River at Oswego is finished and it is probable that trains will begin running over the Beaverton cut-off next Sunday. It is expected that the new train schedule will be announced within the next few days.

The railroad company has notified the railroad commission that with the opening of the new bridge to traffic, a reduction in freight rates will result to certain points. The bridge will cut down the run on certain lines from 90 miles to 23 miles.

New stations will be opened on the Beaverton cut-off at Bonita, Tigard, Scholls and Fanno. The company asks permission to file, effective on less than statutory notice, a tariff supplement to reduce the rates on the West Side and Yamhill divisions, with no advance rates involved.

It also asks that the same publication carry rates to be established to the new stations, as well as a request to amend the tariff with respect to the application of rates which must be fixed to cover traffic through Oswego and Willburg.

It has been rumored that the Corvallis and Sheridan passenger trains will be run over the East Side line from Oswego to the Union depot, and that both Dallas passenger trains will continue running to the Jefferson Street depot. The business men of Dallas should take this matter up with the company at once and see if it will not be possible to have at least one of the passenger trains run into the Union depot.

Dallas has enjoyed such excellent train service from the Southern Pacific Company in the last few years that the people have not been inclined to complain of the old, worn-out, uncomfortable coaches that have been used on the run between this city and Portland, especially those used on the morning train, realizing that as these trains were not run to the Union depot, it was a difficult matter for the company to put on good coaches when needed.

Now that the company will have access to all of its rolling stock, it is hoped that it will see fit to give Dallas neat, comfortable coaches, such as are in use on all other lines running out of Portland.
