Quick work among newspaper men has now become the ordinary routine of the day's work. Many papers issue sporting editions with the final scores of the afternoon's baseball games, in time for the business men to read the paper on the way home from the office.

Bryan's unexpected nomination for the presidency at the Chicago convention--the one where he uttered the phrase, "No cross of gold; no crown of thorns"--caused some very rapid work in the newspaper offices of the city.

Suddenly word came that Bryan was speaking and stampeding the convention. All the preparation of days was lost. New pages had to be set up and the great press had to be "dressed" again.

How a San Francisco paper secured the first publication of the Reno fight is known to many. How the photographs were whisked from the arena in automobiles to a special train, with a car fitted for the developing of films and for the making of cuts for newspaper use.
