MILITARY MANEUVERS

Guardsmen Urged to Attend Annual Encampment This Year.

Urging the importance of a large attendance at the annual encampment at American Lake next month, Major Henry C. Cabell, of Vancouver Barracks, writes Adjutant General Finser as follows:

"I desire to call your attention to the great importance of having as large an attendance as possible at the encampment at American Lake next month. It is fully appreciated that members of the National Guard cannot always conveniently leave their civil vocations to perform their military duties, but it is so necessary to have a full attendance in order to derive any considerable benefit from the camp that every effort should be made to secure the presence of as many men as possible. It is confidently believed that if the members of the Militia and their employers can be impressed with the importance of this matter, no difficulty will be experienced, as the patriotism of the American people is such that they would be unwilling to hamper the Government in its efforts to train the Nation's defenders.

"Congress this year has appropriated over a million and a quarter of dollars for the maneuvers, and we should do all we can to render a full return for this liberality. As President Washington said, it is necessary to prepare for war in time of peace. After hostilities have commenced it is too late. The conditions of modern warfare require such a high degree of discipline and such thorough training that much preparation is required before soldiers are ready to take the field against an enemy. The maneuver camps are the most important part of the year's training and no man should be absent if it is possible for him to attend.

"It is hoped, therefore, that all members of the National Guard will make every effort to be present and that their employers will see the necessity of granting vacations during the encampment to those young men whose patriotism has led them to join the National Guard in order to prepare themselves to defend the Nation in the time of the Nation's need."

Will Leave August 8.
The officers and members of Company H, Oregon National Guard, have received orders to leave Dallas for the encampment at American Lake on the 8:55 train on the morning of August 8.

LEVEL-HEADED VIEWS

Jay Bowerman Addresses Vast Audience in Marion Square.

Two thousand people gathered in Marion Square in Salem, Wednesday evening, and listened to a speech by Acting Governor Jay Bowerman, assembly candidate for the nomination for the office of Governor. The affair was in the nature of a reception to the Acting Governor, Mr. Bowerman having been born and raised near Salem. The speaker told of his boyhood days in Salem, of the pleasure it gave him to speak before the people that he had known practically all of his life and the people that he could really call his "home folk."

"I do not appear as a candidate in my own behalf," he declared, "but in behalf of 1200 Republicans from over the state who assembled in Portland as representatives of the great Republican party in Oregon.

"And because I know these men speak the feeling of the people of Oregon and represent them, I believe I will be elected governor of this state. In such capacity I will do as I have done in the past. I will safeguard the interests of the taxpayers. I will make appointments, not because the appointees are my personal friends or my political friends, but I will make appointments of men, who are perfectly equipped for the offices to which they are assigned.

"I am in favor of good roads, of good schools, and of conservation—not the conservation of the theorists, but the conservation which means development, as the resources of this state are her proudest boast.

"I want to develop the schools and make the children who attend them without peer in any state in the Union. I have been frequently accused of being a corporation lawyer, but did you ever hear of a corporation lawyer living in a town of 1200 people?"

"I will decline to tamper with any law written on the statute books of the state by the people.

"I declare that the only way to defeat the system of political brigandage is in meetings such as was held in Portland last week. Do not allow an opposite party to come in and nominate your candidates at the primaries and then knife them at the polls."

FARM HOUSE BURNS

Residence of Late Joshua McDaniel Totally Destroyed.

The large two-story dwelling on the Joshua McDaniel ranch, one-half mile west of Rickreall, was totally destroyed by fire at noon Tuesday.

The fire had gained great headway before discovered and no fire-fighting apparatus was at hand; so the occupants could do nothing to save the house and contents. For a time a large hophouse close to the house was in danger, and it took the combined efforts of the farm hands and those of neighbors to keep the fire from spreading to the yard.

The loss suffered by the McDaniels is placed at \$2000, with no insurance.

Newport Mystery Unsolved.

The gunnysack mystery at Newport is apparently as far from solution as on the day the body of the murdered young woman was found on the beach. The body was at first believed to be that of Miss Sophia Nola, who disappeared from Newport, October 17, 1904, but two sisters of the deceased young woman are unable to identify the remains as those of Miss Nola. The sisters say that Miss Nola had her teeth filled with gold a short time before she went to Newport. The teeth in the skeleton do not show any signs of having been so filled. Lincoln County officers are still working on the case.

Death Claims Heide.

Mrs. R. V. Williamson, a bride of five months, died of appendicitis at the family home in Portland, Monday night. Mrs. Williamson's maiden name was Nita Davis. She was a daughter of the Reverend Davis, pastor of the Baptist Church in Independence, and a sister of Harold Davis, of this city. She was 22 years old.
