MEETS INSTANT DEATH

EARL MILLER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT, CRIES "O, PAPA," AND DIES.

Rifle in Hands of Harold Miller Prematurely Discharged, Shooting Little Brother Just Above Heart.

Earl Miller, the 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Miller, was killed by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of his brother Harold at the family home in East Dallas, Saturday afternoon.

Harold was hunting gophers in a field near the house, and was accompanied by his father, his brother Earl, and the little son of Frank Holman. While walking along, Harold laughingly remarked that he could beat his father shooting and handed the latter to engage with him in a test of marksmanship. Mr. Miller accepted the challenge. A target was soon placed in position and father and son prepared to begin the contest. Harold was to shoot first.

Having cocked the gun, a 22-caliber rifle, the young marksman was in the act of raising it to shoot, when the weapon caught in his clothing and was prematurely discharged. The ball struck little Earl in the left breast, just above the heart. Crying, "O, papa," the wounded lad sank to the ground, dying almost instantly.

News of the sad affair soon reached town, and many friends called at the home during the afternoon to extend their sympathy to the grief-stricken family. Little Earl was a bright boy and had many friends not only among his young schoolmates, but among the older people of the town as well. His sudden and tragic death is deeply mourned by all.

The funeral was held from the family residence yesterday morning and was largely attended. The service was conducted by the Reverend George Hopkins, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Burial took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

Suffers From Blood Poisoning.

Mrs. A. H. Harris is seriously ill at the family home in this city. A few days ago, while engaged in her household duties, she ran a small fir splinter into one of her fingers. Little attention was given to the hurt at the time, as it was not thought to be serious. Later, blood poisoning set in, and her entire arm is now affected. The injury is causing her intense suffering.
