ANOTHER INQUITOUS MEASURE.

Among the many U'ren measures to be submitted to the people of Oregon at the November election is one to amend Section 2 of the Direct Primary law. This particular measure is so iniquitous that we herewith present a few of its provisions for the consideration of the voters of Polk County.

The proposed bill provides that delegates to the National conventions shall hereafter be elected under the Direct Primary, and it further provides for a change of the date of the primary election in Presidential years.

According to its provisions, the primary nominating election shall be held in September, excepting in the years when a President and Vice-President of the United States are to be elected.

Section D provides that every delegate to a National convention shall receive from the State treasury the amount of his railroad fare, hotel bills, and other necessary traveling expenses.

From time out of mind, it has been the custom for delegates to a National convention to pay their own traveling expenses, just as the delegates to a county or state convention pay their's.

Capable men can always be found who received the honor of representing their state in a National convention sufficient compensation for any expense incurred in making the trip.

This bill is another of the impracticable, expensive U'ren measures that deserves defeat at the hands of the voters of Oregon.

CONSUME GRASS AND PREVENT SPREAD OF FIRE IN TIMBER.

Sheep raising has in many cases been found very effective in preventing forest fires in the national forests. By consuming the grasses and other forage which naturally carry the fire across the open ridges from one body of timber to another, grazing performs what was formerly accomplished by yearly burning and without the bad results of the latter. It is not necessary to graze to the extent of injuring the native grasses to effectively prevent forest fire.

Grazing in a conservative manner which insures a full utilization of the forage crop is sufficient. On the most important grazing areas in national forests, which are usually located in the yellow pine regions, the effect of grazing as a fire preventive is said to have been conclusively shown.

The usual fires of the pine country are what are known as grass fires. These do considerable damage to large timber, but are most injurious to the young growth, whose thin bark can not withstand even the heat of a slight grass fire.

Sheep trails and driveways are usually laid off on the summits of the mountains, which are the natural roads for ingress and egress to the sheep ranges on the national forests.

In some cases sheep grazing has injured young growth and it has been necessary to restrict it in such places. In Eastern Washington and Oregon, such grazing in the open pine timber has not proven undesirable.

In the past, some fires have been traced to careless stock men, but this is seldom the case now. The presence of stock men in the forested areas is now considered a safeguard. They have rendered valuable assistance time and again in reporting and fighting fires, and they unquestionably add to the already efficient fire fighting force, maintained by the forest service.—Portland Journal.

ROOSEVELT DEFEATED

BEATEN FOR CHAIRMAN OF NEW YORK CONVENTION.

State Central Committee Elects Vice-President Sherman by Vote of 20 to 15.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's name was presented for the office of temporary chairman of the Republican State Convention at the meeting of the Republican State Committee in New York, Tuesday, but his selection for that honor was lost by a vote of 20 to 15.

Vice-President James S. Sherman was named as temporary chairman of the coming state-convention by a unanimous vote, following the unsuccessful attempt to make Colonel Roosevelt the temporary chairman of the convention.

The committee selected Saratoga and September 27 as the place and time for the convention. After the committee had been called to order and the time and place of the state convention chosen, William J. Barnes, Jr., of Albany, offered a resolution presenting the name of Vice-President Sherman for temporary chairman of the state convention.

Lloyd C. Griscom moved to substitute the name of Colonel Roosevelt, and also moved that the vote be postponed until later. After much debate, the motion to postpone was defeated by a vote of 12 to 23.

The resolution to make Colonel Roosevelt temporary chairman was then lost by a vote of 20 to 15, following which Vice-President Sherman was unanimously chosen, Mr. Griscom and Henry Mack of New York not voting.

Will Contest For Delegation. Between now and September 27 it is expected a struggle between the organization and the Roosevelt-Hughes forces will be carried into every corner of the state, the chief issue to be at the primaries for the election of Roosevelt or anti-Roosevelt delegates to the convention.

Whether Vice President Sherman lent his support to the movement which resulted in Colonel Roosevelt's defeat is not entirely established. National Committeeman Ward, one of the leaders of the anti-Roosevelt combine, is quoted as having said Sherman drew plans to endorse him for temporary chairman, others say Sherman knew nothing of it.

Lloyd C. Griscom, who presented Roosevelt's name before the convention said, "I do not know whether today's action will have any effect on Roosevelt's attitude toward the state campaign. Mr. Taft, so far as I know, did not anticipate his name would be presented."

Colonel Roosevelt had planned to keep in the background during the coming campaign. It was only when he perceived the turn of political affairs that he consented to the use of his name as temporary chairman.

Both he and Chairman Woodruff express the hope of a harmonious settlement of the differences between the progressives and the "old guard," but there is no harmony talk among the politicians now.

Colonel Roosevelt said after the meeting: "To various persons who asked me whether I would be temporary chairman, I said that I would only do so if they were sure, after knowing my attitude, that they desired me, but my speech would be of such a character that it might help if the committee named the right kind of a man on a clear-cut, progressive platform, but that it would hurt if neither the right kind of a man was named nor the right kind of platform adopted."
