WHO ARE PRIMARY'S FRIENDS?

The assembly candidates are not
willing to trust to your judgment, but
must help you make up your mind
how you want to vote. Is the hyster-
ical cry of the Portland Journal and a
few other shyster political organs.
No one but a natural born fool will
permit himself to be deceived by such
cheap clap-trap. The truth is, the as-
sembly candidates are quietly attend-
ing to their own business and letting
the voters alone, while the anti-assem-
bly howlers are running around over
the state and resorting to every meth-
od known to demagogues in an effort
to influence the people to their way of
thinking.

Who is it that is trying to tell you
how to vote this year? Is it Mr.
Bowerman? Is it Mr. Hoyt? Or Mr.
Benson? Is it not rather the Bourne
and the McGinnis and the Hofers?
Ask yourself this question, voter, and
see how effectively it answers the ac-
cusement that the assembly candidates
are trying to do your thinking for you.
The Observer does not believe that
any sensible, clear-thinking man will
be deceived by these "patriots for of-
fice only." The people of Oregon
know which set of candidates is liv-
ing up to the spirit of the primary law.
They know that the men recommended
by the assembly are quietly and de-
cently submitting their candidacy to
the people, standing ready and will-
ing to cheerfully abide by the judg-
ment of the voters as expressed by
the ballot at the September primary.
They know further that these candi-
dates stand pledged to support the
ticket nominated by the people in
that primary.

But what of Bourne, who declares
that if the Republicans nominate as-
sembly candidates he will vote for
Democrat? And what of other anti-
assembly candidates who refuse to say
what they will do if assembly candi-
dates are chosen in the primary? Is
this willingness to repudiate the peo-
ple's will in accord with the spirit of
direct primary law? Is it not equiva-
lent to saying that these anti-assem-
bly candidates are willing to abide by
the people's will, provided only that
the people's will happens to serve
their own selfish ends?

OPPOSITION DYING OUT.

It is a fact worthy of mention that
the number of Republican newspapers
in Oregon fighting the assembly is
steadily growing less. Prior to the
Republican papers were hostile to the
plan. This condition is longer ex-
ists. Personal of our exchanges each
week discloses a steadily diminishing
opposition, until today, out of a total
of more than one hundred Republican
papers in the state, scarcely a half-
dozen are fighting the assembly candi-
dates.

The cause of this change of attitude
is evident to any thinking mind. In
the first place, the editors who op-
posed the assembly at the outset, in the
fear that an effort was being made to
set aside the primary law, have found
that this gathering of Republicans did
not take away from the voters of Ore-
gon a single right or privilege. They
further see these assembly candidates
going quietly about their business af-
fairs, leaving their candidacy in the
hands of the people and willing to sub-
mit to the popular verdict on the 24th
day of September, while a miscella-
neous horde of disgruntled politicians
and professional pig-hunters, posing as
anti-assembly candidates, are running
around over the state, engaged in the
most unseemly and disgusting scram-
ble for office it has ever been the lot
of the Oregon voter to witness.

The greater part of this pretended
opposition to the assembly is nothing
more in reality than a well-laid plan
to defeat the Republican party in the
state. Awakening to a realization of this
fact, these editors are unwilling to
lead their influence to the game. Even
this early in the campaign, opposition
to the assembly candidates among Re-
publican newspapers has almost en-
tirely disappeared, and it may be con-
sistently predicted that between now
and September 24 the list of papers
fighting the assembly will dwindle
down to a few Democratic sheets and
that previous pair of twins—the Por-
tland Journal and Hofers' Journal.

California's oil wells brought wealth
to that state last year to the amount
of \$22,000,000. Just a reminder of
the good things to store for Western
Oregon, and Dallas in particular, when
the Polk County wells begin produc-
ing.

In his announcement of his candi-
dacy appearing in Oregon newspapers,
Colonel Hofer advises himself as
"the rainmaker who saved the state
\$3,000,000 in crops in 1909." This is
doubtless the Colonel's little joke, but
it will occur to the average voter that
the proper place for a clown is in the
sawdust ring, and not among the candi-
dates for the dignified office of Gov-
ernor.

Forty-eight thousand hop pickers
are at work in the Willamette Valley.
The wages paid in the next two weeks
will supply 10,000 or 12,000 Oregon
families with money wherewith to buy
winter groceries, clothing, shoes,
school books, coats, jackets and millin-
ery. As a means of distributing money
among the women and children at a
time of the year when money is
needed, the hop industry stands su-
preme.

Portland is to have a daily Demo-
cratic newspaper. The first number
of the Oregon Daily Democrat is an-
nounced to make its appearance as
soon as the necessary printing machin-
ery can be installed. The advent of
the new daily will be awaited with in-
terest, as it remains to be seen wheth-
er it will attend to its own party busi-
ness, or whether, like the muckraking
Journal, it will pretend to be Demo-
cratic while serving Jonathan Bourne
and trying to run the affairs of the
Republican party.

"McGinn and Malarky handled the
assembly movement and the assembly
leaders without gloves," says a report
of the anti-assembly mass meeting
held in Portland, Saturday night. The
reporter might have added that these
brave speakers saved themselves from
being likewise handled when they
backed down and refused to let Walter
L. Toose appear on the same platform
and debate the assembly question with
them. The anti-assembly bunch is ap-
parently not as anxious to meet Toose
as it was a few weeks ago. The expe-
rience of Colonel Hofer in the Dallas
debate has evidently served as a lesson
and a warning.

THEIR GAME IS PLAIN.

A good sample of the reasons for
fighting the republican assembly is
seen in Henry E. McGinn and Dan J.
Malarky, two Irish lawyers of Port-
land. McGinn and Malarky were the
foremost politicians and convention
leaders in the old rule and were among
the real bosses in Portland.

Now to again get control of political
affairs in Portland and Multnomah
county, they are fighting like madmen
to defeat the assembly candidates for
office. And for what cause? To simply
keep in control again. They are both
out of office, as they usually have been,
and by a slimmer of hope to keep in
office they are fighting the assembly
and for no other reason.

They would be for or against the
assembly, or any other plan, if it would
give them the lead and keep them in
good positions. The people are not so
foolish as to be deceived by this thin
thin mist. They are only a sample
of that larger type; there are others
not so far away.—Lebanon Criticism.

McLAIN BACK IN RACE

Petitions of Many Other Candidates
Come Too Late.

Hugh McLain, Democratic candidate
for state railroad commissioner, will
be placed on the ballot for the primary
nominating election. This much was
decided when Chief Clerk Corey, of
the secretary of state's office, received
the balance of names to be attached
to McLain's petitions. These had not
appeared at the secretary's office Sat-
urday night, but came through the
mail yesterday bearing a postmark
which showed they had been received
in the postoffice Saturday afternoon at
2 o'clock.

A number of candidates will not
get on the ballot, however. These in-
clude John A. Jeffery, Democratic can-
didate for congress from the second
district; Ben Irvin, Democratic candi-
date for state senator from the four-
teenth district; George Mowry, candi-
date for circuit judge on the Republi-
can ticket from the eleventh district;
and Gerard Ryzyk, candidate for re-
presentative from Gilliam, Sherman and
Wheeler counties, with Drew J. H. Aus-
tin, of Wilbur, Democratic candidate
for representative from the ninth dis-
trict, also is out of the race.—Salem
Statesman.

HAS EXCITING RUNAWAY

Team Takes Flight at Autocycle and
Becomes Unmanageable.

Sterling Crook had an exciting run-
away as he was driving into town Sat-
urday morning. The horses took
flight at an autocycle near the Dolph
place north of town and ran away,
yanking the spring wagon over the
hills at breakneck speed.

Finding that he was unable to stop
them, Mr. Crook wisely devoted his
efforts to keeping the horses in the
road. Teamsters driving north noted
his hasty manner of entering the town
and obligingly gave him the whole
road.

The team ran until tired out and
was stopped at North Dallas. Mr.
